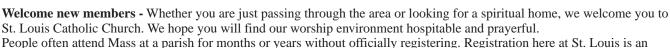

Reflection on the First Reading: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

More than other New Testament writers, Luke used speeches to convey early Christianity's *kerygma* (the salvific message of Christ). Throughout the Acts of the Apostles, this powerful message was communicated by Peter, Stephen, and Paul who, through their speeches, interpreted the events of Jesus' life, death, and Resurrection and showed how these events fulfilled God's salvific plan.

Today's first reading forms part of Peter's third speech, in which he addresses his fellow Jews who marvel over the healing of a lame man, and who presume that Peter and John have done this by their own power. In response, Peter clarifies that the One at work is none other than the God of their ancestors. Peter then emphasizes his central message: Jesus, whom they and their leaders had handed over and had sentenced to death is, in fact, "the Holy and Righteous One," "the Author of Life," and the One whom God raised up and glorified. Strikingly, Peter notes that their action came from their ignorance. This fact justifies the current offer of salvation to them. (Compare this with Jesus' words on the cross in Luke 23:34). To emphasize the enormity of this message, the offer, and their divine origin, Peter declares that these events are the fulfillment of what God had proclaimed though the Prophets.

The speech indicates that Jesus' prophetic power is now found in the words and deeds of the Apostles. Addressed to the Jewish people of the era, the call to "turn to God" offers the promise of being cleansed of their sins, but also the warning that their fate rests in responding to the Apostles' prophetic words. It is, of course, as timely a call now as it was then. (From Workbook for Lectors)

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha's Story (1656 – April 17, 1680) - The blood of martyrs is the seed of saints. Nine years after the Jesuits Isaac Jogues and Jean de Lelande were tomahawked by Iroquois warriors, a baby girl was born near the place of their martyrdom, Auriesville, New York.

Her mother was a Christian Algonquin, taken captive by the Iroquois and given as wife to the chief of the Mohawk clan, the boldest and fiercest of the Five Nations. When she was four,



Tekakwitha lost her parents and little brother in a smallpox epidemic that left her disfigured and half blind. She was adopted by an uncle, who succeeded her father as chief. He hated the coming of the Blackrobes—Jesuit missionaries—but could do nothing to them because a peace treaty with the French required their presence in villages with Christian captives. She was moved by the words of three Blackrobes who lodged with her uncle, but fear of him kept her from seeking instruction. Tekakwitha refused to marry a Mohawk brave, and at 19 finally got the courage to take the step of converting. She was baptized with the name Kateri–Catherine–on Easter Sunday.

Now she would be treated as a slave. Because she would not work on Sunday, Kateri received no food that day. Her life in grace grew rapidly. She told a missionary that she often meditated on the great dignity of being baptized. She was powerfully moved by God's love for human beings and saw the dignity of each of her people.

She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, Kateri stole away one night and began a 200-mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal.

For three years she grew in holiness under the direction of a priest and an older Iroquois woman, giving herself totally to God in long hours of prayer, in charity, and in strenuous penance. At 23, Kateri took a vow of virginity, an unprecedented act for an Indian woman whose future depended on being married. She found a place in the woods where she could pray an hour a day—and was accused of meeting a man there!

Her dedication to virginity was instinctive: Kateri did not know about religious life for women until she visited Montreal. Inspired by this, she and two friends wanted to start a community, but the local priest dissuaded her. She humbly accepted an "ordinary" life. She practiced extremely severe fasting as penance for the conversion of her nation. Kateri Tekakwitha died the afternoon before Holy Thursday. Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed colour and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering, even the pockmarks, disappeared and the touch of a smile came upon her lips. She was beatified in 1980 and canonized in 2012.

Reflection: We like to think that our proposed holiness is thwarted by our situation. If only we could have more solitude, less opposition, better health. Kateri Tekakwitha repeats the example of the saints: Holiness thrives on the cross, anywhere. Yet she did have what Christians—all people—need: the support of a community. She had a good mother, helpful priests, Christian friends. These were present in what we call primitive conditions, and blossomed in the age-old Christian triad of prayer, fasting and almsgiving: union with God in Jesus and the Spirit, self-discipline and often suffering, and charity for her brothers and sisters.
