

Reflection on the First Reading: Acts 9:26-31

The previous weeks have focused on understanding the Easter events, developing ideas about Jesus, the Father, and the early community. This week's readings issue a call: be fruitful. It is not enough to know about the mystery. One must abide in it and bear fruit.

The reading from the Acts of the Apostles introduces Saul/Paul, who first appeared at the stoning of Stephen. Consistent with earlier descriptions of the Jerusalem community, today's reading describes the community's hesitant acceptance of its former foe in a short passage marked by consistency and paradox. In terms of consistency, Paul's credentials are similar to those of the other Apostles: he has seen the Lord, he speaks boldly in the name, and, like the master, he faces apposition even to death. Still, it is paradox that dominates. Saul the persecutor is now Paul the reluctantly accepted Apostle. Saul, earlier in league with the Hellenists, is now opposed to and by the Hellenists. Saul, who approved of the Hellenists' killing of Stephen, is now the object of their hatred. These paradoxes fulfill what had been predicted when Saul first saw the Lord: that he would suffer for the name.

Finally, Paul's rescue by the believers and his addition to the ranks of the Apostles – all linked to geographical expansion and community growth – remind us of the community's active mission. Encouraged by the Holy Spirit, Paul and the Apostles boldly preach in the name of Jesus, thus bearing fruit in the preparation for the next phase: the outreach to the Gentiles. Saint Catherine of Siena's Story (March 25, 1347 – April 29, 1380)

The value Catherine makes central in her short life is complete surrender to Christ. What is most impressive is that she learns to view her surrender to her Lord as a goal to be reached through time.

She was the 23rd child of Jacopo and Lapa Benincasa and grew up as an intelligent, cheerful, and intensely religious person. Catherine disappointed her mother by cutting off her hair as a protest against being overly encouraged to improve her appearance in order to attract a husband. Her father ordered her to be left in peace, and she was given a room of her own for prayer and meditation.

She entered the Dominican Third Order at 18 and spent the next three years in seclusion, prayer, and austerity. Gradually, a group of followers gathered around her—men and women, priests and religious. An active public apostolate grew out of her contemplative life. Her letters, mostly for spiritual instruction and encouragement, began to take more note of public affairs. Opposition and slander resulted from her mixing with the world and speaking with authority of one completely committed to Christ. She was cleared of all charges at the Dominican General Chapter of 1374.

Her public influence reached great heights because of her evident holiness, membership in the Dominican Third Order, and the impression she made on the pope. She worked tirelessly for the crusade against the Turks, for peace between Florence and the pope.

In 1378, the Great Schism began, splitting the allegiance of Christendom between two, then three, popes and putting even saints on opposing sides. Catherine spent the last two years of her life in Rome, in prayer and pleading on behalf of the cause of Pope Urban VI and the unity of the Church. She offered herself as a victim for the Church in its agony. She died surrounded by her "children"; was canonized in 1461.

Catherine ranks high among the mystics and spiritual writers of the Church. In 1939, she and Francis of Assisi were declared copatrons of Italy. Pope Paul VI named her and Teresa of Avila doctors of the Church in 1970. Her spiritual testament is found in *The Dialogue*.

Saint Marie of the Incarnation (1599-1672) - Marie Guyart was born in Tours, France, on Oct. 28, 1599. As a young child of seven, she said "Yes" to the Lord when she dreamed that he asked her to be his. At age 17, although she was attracted to cloistered life, she obeyed her parents and married the master silk worker Claude Martin. He died two years later. At 19 she was a widow with a six-month-old son. She liquidated her husband's business, which was on the verge of bankruptcy and went to live with her family and took care of her son.

From this time, her prayer life grew stronger. She was given a strong sense of the presence of God and sought to intensify her union with the divine, with whom she spoke "with intimacy". She led a profoundly contemplative life, she also remained involved in practical life. She put her administrative talents to good use, when, in 1621, her brother-in-law asked her to take over the management of his transportation company.

Her call to consecrated life pursued her, so in 1631 she asked her sister to look after her son, who was now 12 years old, and she entered the novitiate of the monastery of the Ursulines of Tours. She took the name in religion of Marie of the Incarnation.

In 1639, her superiors invited her to respond to her conviction that God was calling her to Canada, there "to create a house for Jesus and Mary." She embarked from Dieppe on May 4, with two other Ursulines and four Hospital Sisters. When she arrived in Quebec, Marie would later write, "The first thing we did was to kiss the ground of the place to which we had come to fulfill our lives in the service of God and the Indigenous people." She never returned to France.

She organized construction of a small monastery and a boarding school for Indian and French girls.. She welcomed and fed the Huron and Algonquin adults who knocked at the door; gave them Christian instruction. In fact, her door was always open to everyone. It was a welcoming place where everyone could find counsel as well as material help.

She wrote the Constitutions & Rule of the Ursulines of Quebec (1647), created dictionaries, grammars, catechisms and prayer books in four First Nations languages. At the request of her son, by now a member of the Benedictine Order, she wrote an autobiographical memoir on "her states of prayer and of grace". The experiences she reveals place her among the masters of the spiritual life. A collection of her lessons to the novices at Tours has also been conserved. The intensely mystical quality of her writing led the well-known French Bishop Bossuet to give her the nickname of "the Teresa of New France", after Saint Teresa of Avila. She maintained an ongoing correspondence with her relatives, friends and benefactors in France. Marie of the Incarnation died in Quebec on April 30, 1672. She was beatified on June 22, 1980 and canonized on April 3, 2014. (From cccb.ca/the-catholic-church-in-canada)

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
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
