Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

Sacramental Life - St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

Sacrament of Reconciliation - Saturdays 4 - 4:30 p.m., or by appointment.

Marriage - For registered and supporting members, please contact the parish office at least one year in advance of your date.

Reflection on the First Reading: 1 Kings 19:9, 11-13

Today's first reading is the story of the encounter of Elijah with God. To better understand this reading, we should know that Elijah was a Prophet of God in the time of King Ahab, whose wife was Jezebel, a foreigner and worshipper of Baal. After Elijah slayed the Prophets of Baal in Wadi Kishon in Galilee, Jezebel vowed to kill him, so he run all the way to Beersheba, a distance of more than 150 km. He escaped into the wilderness, where he lay down under a broom tree and prayed for death. Miraculously, an Angel came to wake him and tell him to eat and drink what was left for him. When the Angel came again to waken him, Elijah was told again to eat and drink in preparation for a journey, which takes him to Mount Horeb, also known as Sinai.

When he arrived at Horeb, God asks Elijah what he's doing there. Elijah responds with a complaint about how God's people had abandoned the covenant, destroyed God's altars, and killed his Prophets. Elijah adds, "I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away". Arriving at the beginning of our first reading, we hear God telling Elijah to go out and stand on the mountain before God. The phrase "stand before the Lord" is another way of saying the Elijah is being called to service. The fierce wind, earthquake, and fire are all accompaniments to the theophany – a manifestation of the divine – but it is only in the "sound of sheer silence" that Elijah knows God's presence. Thus, he emerged from the cave and hid his face because ancients believed that no one could see God face to face and live. Today, too, we might not see God face to face, but we can see God's activity in the world if we look attentively. Where is God at work in your life?

The prophet Elijah is celebrated and revered as a saint by members of the Carmelite Order, as well as many Eastern Christians, on July 20. It is a feast that honours the life of the Old Testament prophet and his fiery ascent into Heaven. They recognize his extraordinary holiness and faithfulness to God. Even though he lived before the Incarnation of Jesus Christ, he is still seen as a model for all Christians.

The Catechism of the Catholic

Church affirms, "The patriarchs, prophets and certain other Old Testament figures have been and always will be honoured as saints in all the Church's liturgical traditions" (CCC 61).

Carmelites in particular look to Elijah as the official founder of their order. It is believed that a group of monks lived on Mt. Carmel after the ascent of Elijah into Heaven and continued in a life of prayer after the death and resurrection of Jesus.

The Catholic Encyclopaedia explains, "A notice written between 1247 and 1274 states in general terms that "from the days of Elijah and Elias the holy fathers of the Old and the New Dispensation dwelt on Mount Carmel, and that their successors after the Incarnation built there a chapel in honour of Our Lady, for which reason they were called in papal Bulls 'Friars of Blessed Mary of Mount Carmel."

The date of July 20 is an ancient commemoration, though the exact details surrounding this day are difficult to pinpoint. It may have been selected because of its position outside of the Lenten and Easter season, and is generally viewed as the date of Elijah's ascent into Heaven on a fiery chariot (see 2 Kings 2:1-18). Prayers from the Bible – Old Testament Canticles

In the office of readings of the Carmelite Order for July 20th the following three canticles are included:

Antiphon: Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the Lord, for the Lord is passing by.

Canticle I - Happy are those who put their trust in the Lord - Jer 17:7-8

Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.

Canticle II - The happiness of the wise - Sir 14:20, 15:3-5a, 6b

Happy the man who meditates on wisdom, and reasons with good sense. She will give him the bread of understanding to eat, and the water of wisdom to drink. He will lean on her and will not fall, he will rely on her and not be put to shame. She will raise him high above his neighbours, and he will inherit an everlasting name.

Canticle III - *Thanksgiving for delivery from affliction* - Sir 51:1-3b, 4a, 7c, 11, 14ab, 15

I will give thanks to You, Lord and King, and praise You, God my Saviour, I give thanks to Your name; for You have been protector and support to me, and redeemed my body from destruction, from the snare of the lying tongue, from lips that fabricate falsehood.

You have redeemed me, true to the greatness of your mercy, from the perjured tongue slandering me to the king.

Then I remembered Your mercy, Lord, and Your deeds from earliest times. I called on the Lord, the father of my Lord: "Do not desert me in the days of ordeal, I will praise Your name unceasingly, and gratefully sing its praises;" and my plea was heard.

The Assumption is the feast that celebrates Mary's being taken body and soul into Heaven at the end of her earthly life - celebrated on August 15.

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Assumption refers to an event that occurred at the end of the Virgin Mary's life. "Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death." The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians. (CCC 966)

This is a belief in the Catholic Church that has its origin in the first few centuries of Christianity, finding its source in early stories of the Virgin Mary's "death." St. John Damascene, an 8th century Christian author, wrote about how fitting it was for the Virgin Mary to be assumed into Heaven.

"It was fitting that she, who had kept her virginity intact in childbirth, should keep her own body free from all corruption even after death. It was fitting that she, who had carried the Creator as a child at her breast, should dwell in the divine tabernacles. It was fitting that the spouse, whom the Father had taken to himself, should live in the divine mansions. It was fitting that she, who had seen her Son upon the cross and who had thereby received into her heart the sword of sorrow which she had escaped in the act of giving birth to him, should look upon him as he sits with the Father. It was fitting that God's Mother should possess what belongs to her Son, and that she should be honored by every creature as the Mother and as the handmaid of God."

Pius XII details in his apostolic constitution, *Munificentissimus* Deus how this belief has been handed down over the ages and finds evidence even in scripture. "Moreover, the scholastic Doctors have recognized the Assumption of the Virgin Mother of God as something signified, not only in various figures of the Old Testament, but also in that woman clothed with the sun whom John the Apostle contemplated on the Island of Patmos. Similarly they have given special attention to these words of the New Testament: "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you, blessed are you among women," since they saw, in the mystery of the Assumption, the fulfillment of that most perfect grace granted to the Blessed Virgin and the special blessing that countered the curse of Eve. The Assumption is an ancient celebration, one that honours the Virgin Mary and her role in salvation history and the eternal destination prepared for her by her Son, Jesus. (From aleteia.org)

How to Pray the Examen

3. Review your day — recall specific moments and your feelings at the time.

4. Reflect on what you did, said, or thought in those instances. Were you drawing closer to God, or further away?

5. Look toward tomorrow — think of how you might collaborate more effectively with God's plan. Be specific, and conclude with the "Our Father."
