

Reflection on the First Reading: Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

Today's reading from Isaiah begins with the word "comfort." God's people, referred to collectively as "Jerusalem," are comforted because a new beginning is on the horizon: "she [Jerusalem] has served her term, ... her penalty is paid." Their comfort lies in God's redemptive actions toward His people. There is also comfort in the continuity of God's presence among them. The phrases "my people" and "your God" recall the covenant formula that would have been familiar to the people: "I will be your God and you will be my people." This covenant relationship is recalled and renewed throughout the OT.

Isaiah continues by depicting what this new beginning looks like though geographical topography that shifts to such a degree that even the earth manifests God's glory and none can ignore it. In this new era, all people will be united before God in praise and worship. The restoration of God's people to new life full of glorifying God is such good news that it needs to be proclaimed from the highest mountaintops to desert paths; everyone must hear the "good tidings."

God's people are exhorted to share this joyous communication. Isaiah refers to God's people as both Jerusalem and Zion and repeats the call using both names: " O Zion, herald of tidings... O Jerusalem,

The Second Week of Advent Represents:

Peace and Preparation. Candle Name: Bethlehem Candle. Color: Purple.

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-ofourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from

Nazareth to Bethlehem.

Scripture Reflection: "And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." Luke 2:4-7

Prayer: Dear Jesus, you entered our world on Christmas as the Prince of Peace. This Advent, as we strive to become the-best-version-ofourselves, fill us with a deep and abiding peace. Help us share that peace with everyone we encounter, especially those who need it most.

The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: Shepherd's Candle. Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

Scripture Reflection: "And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them." Luke 2:20

Prayer: Dear Jesus, help us focus on you during this busy season. May we stay aware of the joy you bring into our lives. We want to find you in the everyday moments and come with hearts of gratitude to your manger on Christmas. Amen.

herald of good tidings." This double reference to God's people in these terms is significant. Even though both terms refer to the same geographic location, in this context the term "Zion" has religious connotations while "Jerusalem" has political connotations. Their use together highlights the impact of the news on the totality of Gods' people, affecting all aspects of their lives.

We are invited to likewise share in the comfort spoken of by Isaiah. Our comfort lies in our redemption through Christ, who is the new and eternal covenant. The birth of Christ, marks a new beginning for all of humanity. As God's people, we are heralds of these glad tidings as we, like Jerusalem/Zion, cry out: "Here is your God!" (From the workbook for Lectors)

The Story of Our Lady of Guadalupe - The feast in honour of Our Lady of Guadalupe goes back to the 16th century. Chronicles of that period tell us the story.

A poor Indian named Cuauhtlatohuac was baptized and given the name Juan Diego. He was a 57-year-old widower, and lived in a small village near Mexico City. On Sat. Dec. 9, 1531, he was on his way to attend Mass in honour of Our Lady.

Juan was walking by a hill called Tepeyac when he heard beautiful music like the warbling of birds. A radiant cloud appeared, and within it stood an Indian maiden dressed like an Aztec princess. The lady spoke to him in his own language and sent him to the bishop of Mexico, a Franciscan named Juan de Zumarraga. The bishop was to build a chapel in the place where the lady appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan to have the lady give him a sign. About this same time Juan's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Juan to try to avoid the lady. Nevertheless the lady found Juan, assured him that his uncle would recover, and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape or tilma.

On Dec. 12, when Juan Diego opened his tilma in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground, and the bishop sank to his knees. On the tilma where the roses had been appeared an image of Mary exactly as she had appeared at the hill of Tepeyac.
