

First Reading from Isaiah 58:6-10++

The third major section of the Book of Isaiah differs from the first two in that it is addressed to the Israelites who have returned from exile in Babylon and are now to rebuild a new nation. Isaiah likens this restored generation to a light that will shine for other nations to see.

While it is clear that political and military concerns will be on the minds of those attempting to rebuild their nation, Isaiah pays particular attention to their treatment of the poor. It is important to locate this reading within the larger framework of the chapter, which focuses on fasting and the need to avoid empty ritualism. Isaiah wants the people to understand that their fasting will be of little consequence if they do not feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, and clothe the naked. These and other acts of compassion will serve to scatter the darkness and reflect the light of God's love.

Moreover, when they show compassion and spirit of goodness, then God's glory will guard them. The Prophet speaks of the people being vindicated. As we read these words, we call to mind how God has protected His people in the past (e.g. When crossing the Red Sea). For Isaiah, attention to the poor and the oppressed will be like a key that opens the door to success for the former refugees. He envisions the return to the Promised Land as a renewal of the covenant that summons the people to act as God has acted towards them. 
Saint Paul Miki and Companions' Story - Nagasaki, Japan, is familiar as the city on which the second atomic bomb was dropped, immediately killing over 37,000 people. Three and a half centuries before, 26 martyrs of Japan were crucified on a hill, called the Holy Mountain, overlooking Nagasaki. Among them were priests, brothers, laymen, Franciscans, Jesuits, members of the Secular Franciscan Order; there were catechists, doctors, artisans, servants, old men and innocent children—all united in a common faith and love for Jesus and His Church.

Br. Paul Miki, a Jesuit and a native of Japan, has become the best known among the martyrs of Japan. While hanging upon a cross, Paul Miki preached to the people gathered for the execution: "The sentence of judgment says these men came to Japan from the Philippines, but I did not come from any other country. I am a true Japanese. The only reason for my being killed is that I have taught the doctrine of Christ. I certainly did teach the doctrine of Christ. I thank God it is for this reason I die. I believe that I am telling only the truth before I die. I know you believe me and I want to say to you all once again: Ask Christ to help you to become happy. I obey Christ. After Christ's example I forgive my persecutors. I do not hate them. I ask God to have pity on all, and I hope my blood will fall on my fellow men as a fruitful rain."

When missionaries returned to Japan in the 1860s, at first they found no trace of Christianity. But after establishing themselves they found that thousands of Christians lived around Nagasaki and that they had secretly preserved the faith. Beatified in 1627, the martyrs of Japan were finally canonized in 1862. (From Franciscanmedia.org)

The Story of Our Lady of Lourdes - On Dec. 8, 1854, Pope Pius IX proclaimed the dogma of the Immaculate Conception in the apostolic constitution *Ineffabilis Deus*. A little more than three years later, on Feb. 11, 1858, a young lady appeared to Bernadette Soubirous. This began a series of visions. During the apparition on March 25, the lady identified herself with the words: "I am the Immaculate Conception."

Bernadette was a sickly child of poor parents. Their practice of the Catholic faith was scarcely more than lukewarm. Bernadette could pray the Our Father, the Heil Mary and the Croed She also know the



During interrogations Bernadette gave an account of what she saw. It was "something white in the shape of a girl." She used the word aquero, a dialect term meaning "this thing." It was "a pretty young girl with a rosary over her arm." Her white robe was encircled by a blue girdle. She wore a white veil. There was a yellow rose on each foot. A rosary was in her hand. Bernadette was also impressed by the fact that the lady did not use the informal form of address (tu), but the polite form (vous). The humble virgin appeared to a humble girl and treated her with dignity.

Through that humble girl, Mary revitalized and continues to revitalize the faith of millions of people. People began to flock to Lourdes from other parts of France and from all over the world. In 1862 Church authorities confirmed the authenticity of the apparitions and authorized the cult of Our Lady of Lourdes for the diocese. The Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes became worldwide in 1907. PRAYERS STRAIGHT FROM THE BIBLE:

The second most well known prayer from the Bible is the Hail Mary Prayer – and it came together slowly.

"Hail, Full of Grace! The Lord is with you." (Luke 1:28)

The angel refered to Mary as "Full of Grace" indicating that there was no room for sin, or any impurity in her.

The earliest version of this prayer added Mary's name to the message delivered by the angel Gabriel: "Hail Mary, Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee."

Around 1050 AD, the words Elizabeth used to greet Mary during the Visitation were added: "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb" (Luke 1:42). In 1261, Pope Urban IV added the name of Jesus to the end of Elizabeth's words.

St. Peter Canisius published the Hail Mary in his 1555 Catechism with almost the entire final petition: "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners."

Eleven years later, the Catechism of the Council of Trent (a work that Canisius was instrumental in creating) included, for the first time, the entire final petition, concluding with the words "now and at the hour of our death. Amen."

The version of the Hail Mary we pray today was given official approval

Hail Mary, Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women; and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen. (From dynamiccatholic.com)
