

Reflection on the First Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

In today's first reading, we hear of the promise of a Prophet-like-Moses who will come to lead the people. In the Gospels, Jesus is identified as the promised Prophet-like-Moses. While Moses' prophetic role is highlighted in this reading, Moses is never called a Prophet in any of the books of the Pentateuch. This is the closest he comes to that designation, and here his prophetic role is described as an intermediary between God and God's people. Moses reminds the people that they requested the establishment of this role because they feared direct interaction with God. Today's reading emphasized the establishment of a permanent channel of communication between God and His people.

It describes how Prophets will act and how they communicate the message of God. God's promise, "I will put my words in his [the Prophet-like-Moses'] mouth," affirms the Prophet as God's spokesperson and envoi. The Prophets are chosen by God and are given His words to speak. They should only speak God's words to the people. However, this reading also warns against two types of false prophecy. First, we see that there can be false oracles presented by the Prophet as God's words. Second, false Prophets might proclaim oracles from other gods. God will condemn both types. Additionally, those who do not heed the Prophet when he conveys God's words will answer to God Himself.

This reading from Deuteronomy assures us of God's continual efforts to communicate with us and His commitment to ensuring that His

The Story of the Presentation of the Lord - At the end of the fourth century, a woman named Etheria made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Her journal, discovered in 1887, gives an unprecedented glimpse of liturgical life there. She describes the Epiphany, the observance of Christ's



birth, and the gala procession in honour of His Presentation in the Temple 40 days later. Under the Mosaic Law, a woman was ritually "unclean" for 40 days after childbirth, when she was to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice—her "purification." Contact with anyone who had brushed against mystery—birth or death—excluded a person from Jewish worship. This feast emphasizes Jesus' first appearance in the Temple more than Mary's purification.

The observance spread throughout the Western Church in the 5th and 6th centuries. Because the Church in the West celebrated Jesus' birth on Dec. 25, the Presentation was moved to Feb. 2, 40 days later.

In the 8th century, Pope Sergius inaugurated a candlelight procession and the blessing and distribution of candles which continues to this day and gives the feast its popular name: Candlemas.

Reflection - In Luke's account, Jesus was welcomed in the temple by two elderly people, Simeon and the widow Anna. They embody Israel in their patient expectation; they acknowledge the infant Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah. St. Simeon burst into a song of joy which the Church still sings at day's end. Saint John Bosco's Story (August 16, 1815 – January 31, 1888)

John Bosco's theory of education could well be used in today's schools. It was a preventive system, rejecting corporal punishment and placing students in surroundings removed from the likelihood of committing sin. He advocated frequent reception of the sacraments of Penance and Holy Communion. He combined catechetical training and guidance to unite the spiritual life with one's work, study and play.

John was ordained in 1841. His service to young people started when he met a poor orphan in Turin, and instructed him in preparation for receiving Holy Communion. He then gathered young apprentices and taught them catechism.

After serving as chaplain in a hospice for working girls, Don Bosco opened the Oratory of St. Francis de Sales for boys. Several wealthy patrons contributed funds, enabling him to open shoemaking and tailoring workshops for the boys.

By 1856, the institution had grown to 150 boys and had added a printing press for publication of religious and catechetical pamphlets. John's interest in vocational education and publishing justify him as patron of young apprentices and Catholic publishers.

John's preaching fame spread and by 1850 he had trained his own helpers because of difficulties in retaining young priests. In 1854, he and his followers informally banded together, inspired by Saint Francis de Sales. With Pope Pius IX's encouragement, John gathered 17 men and founded the Salesians in 1859 for education and mission work. Later, he organized a group of Salesian Sisters to assist girls.

Reflection - John Bosco educated the whole person—body and soul. He believed that Christ's love and our faith in that love should pervade everything we do. For John Bosco, being a Christian was a full-time effort, not a once-a-week, Mass-on-Sunday experience. It is searching and finding God and Jesus in everything we do, letting love lead us. Because John realized the importance of job-training and the self-worth that come with talent and ability, he trained his students in the trade crafts, too. St. John Bosco is a Patron Saint of: Boys, Editors, Educators/Teachers and Youth. (From franciscanmedia.org)
