

The First Reading from Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14-16

The first reading for today's feast is part of a unit that begins with the words". This entire commandment that I command you today you must diligently observe" (Dt 8:1). It provides a recollection of the past to urge obedience to the covenant. The recollection is of the manna that God provided to the Israelites in their sojourn in the wilderness (Ex 16:4-15) and the water from the rock that God provided when the Israelites were thirsty (Ex 17:1-7). The reward associated with observing the commandments is to live and prosper in the land that was promised to their ancestors.

But Moses observes that the commandments are God's way of teaching discipline to God's people, like a father would teach his son. And what does God want to teach the people? He wants them to learn reliance of God so that they never assume that their prosperity comes from their own hands.

Precepts of the Catholic Church - are a description of the absolute minimum actions required of Catholics regarding the Church.

The Church uses these precepts to remind us that Christian life requires a commitment to prayer and active participation in the liturgy and sacraments. If we fall below this bare-minimum level, we can't rightly consider ourselves to be in full communion with the Catholic Church. Each of these precepts of the Catholic Church is a requirement. Together with the Ten Commandments, they represent the minimum level of moral living. Intentional violation of the precepts, or the Commandments is a grave matter, meaning a mortal sin.

The Precepts:

- You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from unnecessary labour. - We must "sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord" (Sunday), as well as the principal feast days, known as Catholic holy days of obligation. This requires attending Mass, "and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days."
- You shall confess your sins at least once a year. We must prepare for the Eucharist by means of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). This sacrament "continues Baptism's work of conversion and forgiveness."
- You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season. - This "guarantees as a minimum the reception of the Lord's Body and Blood in connection with the Paschal feasts, the origin and center of the Christian liturgy."
- You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church. - "The fourth precept ensures the times of self-discipline and penance which prepare us for the liturgical feasts and help us acquire mastery over our instincts and freedom of heart." See below for more about fasting & abstinence.
- You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church. "The 5th precept means that the faithful are obliged to assist with the material needs of the Church, each according to his own ability."

(These quotations are from the Catechism of the Catholic Church, in its section about the Precepts of the Catholic Church (#2041-3).)

Note that these precepts are required, unless you have a legitimate reason for not meeting them. For example: If you are sick, tending to a sick child, or camping in the wilderness on Sunday and cannot get to Mass, it is not a grave violation to miss Mass that day. Children, the elderly, and pregnant or nursing women do not have to fast on normal fast days (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday). Always remember: the precepts of the Catholic Church are minimum levels of participation in the life of the Church. Out of love for Christ and a desire to advance in the spiritual life, you will normally try to do far more than they require. Go beyond the minimum!

On May 28th Bishop Crosby wrote a letter to all Catholics in the Diocese of Hamilton removing the dispensation from the obligation to participate at Sunday Mass, effective on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), June 11, 2023. This letter was read in the church and is available on our parish website (on Welcome page).

The Catholic Doctrine of the Real Presence – Fr. Kenneth Baker, S.J.

By "Real Presence" is meant that the true Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ are really and substantially present under the Eucharistic species, that is, the appearances of bread and wine which remain on the altar after the Consecration.

"Presence" is one of those basic realities which we all experience and all know, but which is difficult to describe and define. Basically it means "being at hand", "being in front of"; when it is said of persons, often it also has the added meaning of "being for" or "being with", in the sense of accompanying someone.

A moment's reflection will reveal that God is present to us in a number of ways. By His power He is present in all of creation, since He conserves everything in its being. He is present in the souls of the just by His sanctifying grace. He is present in His Church which is the New Israel, the holy people of God. He is present in bishops and priests in a special way by reason of their consecration in Holy Orders. He is present, in a different way, in Holy Scripture and in the proclamation of His holy Word. These are some of the various ways in which God is present to his people.

But when the Church says that the glorified Jesus is really present in the Holy Eucharist, she is talking about a different and very special kind of presence. She means that, by the almighty power of God, a stupendous miracle has taken place, namely, the substance and reality of bread and wine have been changed into the substance and reality of the Body and Blood of the Resurrected Jesus Christ who is now seated at the right hand of the Father in heaven. Therefore, since Jesus Christ is God and God is worthy of adoration, it follows that the Lord, truly present under the appearances of bread and wine, is worthy of adoration in the Holy Eucharist. For this reason the Church surrounds the Mass and the Eucharist with various gestures of adoration: incense, bows, genuflections, silence, candles, formal liturgical clothing.

It is not difficult to show from history the unanimity of belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist for the first 1500 years of the Church. Occasional doubts about it, such as those of Berengarius of Tours (d. 1088), caused an instant uproar - which attests to the universal acceptance of the Real Presence. This unanimous belief of 1500 years is itself an argument for its truth. For it is impossible that the Holy Spirit could leave the Church in error over a long period of time about one of the central doctrines of Christianity.

Widespread doubts and denials of, the Real Presence appeared in the 16th c. The Protestant Reformers were unanimous in rejecting transubstantiation and the sacrificial character of the Eucharist, and they did not agree on the question of the Real Presence. Because of the denials and doubts by the Protestant Reformers about the Mass and the Real Presence, the Council of Trent (1545-1563) took up each of these questions and laid out for all the official, infallible teaching of the Church. Thus, the Council declared: "If anyone denies that the Body and Blood, together with the Soul and Divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, the whole Christ is truly, really, and substantially contained in the sacrament of the most holy Eucharist, but says that Christ is present in the Sacrament only as in a sign or figure, or by His power: let him be anathema" (Denzinger-Schunmetzer 1651).



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
