Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

Sacramental Life - St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

The First Reading from Exodus 19:1-6

Chapter 19 of the Book of Exodus begins the third part of Exodus that tells the story of God establishing a covenant with the children of Israel and bestowing upon them a code of law. It has taken the newly released exiles three months to journey out of Egypt beyond the Red Sea through the desert wilderness to finally arrive and set up camp at Mount Sinai, the holy mountain of God.

Upon their arrival, the first order of business is for God to speak individually to Moses. In revealing His covenant to the people, God will proceed to call Moses apart from them to instruct him and to foster the development of a relationship. This symbolizes that God will come to establish covenant with the Israelite nation as a whole. The words God speaks to Moses here are meant to serve as a personal introduction that will remind the former slaves of how God has acted in the past on their behalf in order that they might expect His divine assistance in the future. God highlights His actions against the Egyptians as the care He showed the Israelites by stating that He "bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself." Instead of belonging to Pharaoh and all of Egypt, they are now God's "treasured possession." God demonstrates here a preferential option for Israel, as He desires to make them a people set apart. The notion of being separated from other nations is made clear in choosing them to be a holy people. It is not simply that Israel is made sacred to God but that they are to perform the role of mediating on behalf of other peoples, as priests are set apart to minister to others and be in God's presence.

The Eucharistic Miracles

Eucharistic miracles are God's extraordinary interventions, meant to confirm faith in the Real Presence of the Body and Blood of the Lord in the Eucharist. We know the Catholic teaching on the Real Presence. With the words of consecration: "This is my body," "This is my blood." the substance of bread becomes the Body of Christ, and the substance of wine His Blood. This marvellous change is called transubstantiation, that is to say, the passage of substance. Of the bread and wine there remain only the appearances or species, which, with a philosophical term, are called accidents. In other words, only the dimensions, colour, taste, smell and even the nutritive capacity remain. But the substance, that is to say, the true reality does not remain, for it has become the Body and Blood of the Lord.

Transubstantiation can in no way be experienced by the senses; only faith assures us of this marvellous change.

The Eucharistic miracles are meant to confirm this faith, which is based on Jesus's words according to which what seems like bread is no longer bread, and what seems wine is no longer wine. In fact, in the Eucharistic miracles the flesh and blood-or one or the other-appear, depending on the situation. The purpose of these miracles is to show that we must not look at the external appearance (bread and wine) but at the substance, to the true reality of the thing, which is flesh and blood.

Medieval theologians have carefully examined the matter of Eucharistic Miracles (which were very frequent in their day) and have given various interpretations; but the best founded and most reasonable one seems to be that of St. Thomas Aquinas, the "Eucharistic Doctor" par excellence (Summa Theolgica III, q. 76, a. 8).

He says that the body and blood which appear after a miracle are due to the transformation of the Eucharistic species, namely, of the accidents, and do not touch the true substance of the Body and Blood of Christ. In other words, the species of bread and wine are miraculously changed into the species of flesh and blood; but the true Body and true Blood of Jesus are not those which appear but those which, even before the miracle, were hidden beneath the species of flesh and blood.

If, in fact, the flesh and blood which appear were truly the flesh and blood of Christ, we would have to say that the risen Jesus, who reigns impassibly at the right hand of the Father, loses a part of His flesh and blood, something which in no way can be accepted.

We must therefore say that the flesh and blood which appear in the miracles are in the order of species or appearances, neither more nor less than the order of the species of bread and wine.

The Lord performs these miracles to give us a sign, easy and visible to all, that in the Eucharist there is the true Body and true Blood of the Lord.

But this true Body and this true Blood are not those that appear, but rather those that are substantially contained under the species or appearances, species and appearances that, before the miracle, were those of bread and wine, and after the miracle are those of flesh and blood.

Under the appearances of flesh and blood Jesus is truly and substantially contained as He was before the miracle. For this reason we can adore Jesus truly present under the species of flesh and blood. Fr.Roberto Coggi, O.P.

Carlo Acutis (1991-2006) was born into a wealthy-but not particularly religious-Italian family in London, England. The family moved to Milan, Italy shortly after his birth. Showing a natural interest in religion, he received First Holy Communion at his own request when he was seven years old. This marked a beginning in a devotion to the Eucharist that was to remain with him his entire life.

Throughout his brief life, he looked towards particular saints as guides and intercessors, including St. Tarcisius, St. Dominic Savio, St. Bernadette Soubirous, and Sts. Jacinta and Francisco Marto.

In school, Carlo was a friend and defender of disabled and bullied students and he volunteered in charitable organizations that served the homeless and poor.

Very much a product of his times, Carlo enjoyed movies and playing video games on his PlayStation. He showed a great interest in computers and the internet and he created a website dedicated to cataloguing Eucharistic miracles. In this, he was inspired by the ideas of BI. Giacomo Alberione and his commitment to using modern means of communication to evangelize.

Carlo developed M3 fulminant leukemia and he reflected, "I offer to the Lord the sufferings that will have to undergo for the Pope and for the Church." He died from the disease on October 12, 2006.

Bl. Carlo Acutis was beatified in 2020. He is popularly honoured as a heavenly patron of youth and of computer programmers.
