First Reading from Genesis 12:1 – 4

Today's first reading is one of three accounts of the covenant that God made with Abram. The other two accounts are Gen 15 & Gen 17:1-21. Each is interesting in its own right, but together they paint a vibrant picture of Abram's relationship with God. It is in the last of these three accounts that God changes Abram's name to Abraham, meaning "father of nations." But in this first account we hear today, we learn of God's invitation to Abram to leave his family and homeland to migrate to Shechem in the land of Canaan, which is the central part of the West Bank today. Later he would migrate to Negev in southern Israel.

Tradition tells us that he was living in Haran (in modern southeastern Turkey) at the time, but his original homeland was Ur of the Chaldees (in southern Iraq today). These are extremely long distances to travel on foot and with all their flocks and other belongings, especially when the command from God that he does not yet know is so vague: "Go ... to the land that I will show you."

This same God bestows a series of blessing on Abram. Some biblical scholars argue, based on the Hebrew text, that there are seven, but the English translation makes it hard to enumerate them exactly. Seven is a perfect number, representing fullness. God also gives two promises: multitudes of descendants and possession of the land. Constructing altars to the God who appeared to Abram indicates that he acknowledges God as One in authority. (*From the Workbook for Lectors & Proclaimers of the Word*)

Saint Francis de Sales, was in many ways rather like us, struggling to learn patience, wanting to vault the spiritual heights, but consigned to the baby steps. This is a man who knows better than to grab at the high shelf before he has grown

enough to reach it, or to settle for the low one out of laziness. And so he writes:

God takes pleasure to see you take your little steps; and like a good father who holds his child by the hand, he will accommodate his steps to yours and will be content to go no faster than you. Why do you worry? Baby steps ...

You learn to speak by speaking, to study by studying, to run by running, to work by working; and just so, you learn to love by loving. All those who think to learn in any other way deceive themselves.

Don't panic if you don't have your Lenten season "all settled" today:

Never be hurried in anything. Do all things calmly and in a spirit of repose. Do not lose your inward peace, even if everything seems to be going wrong. What is anything in life compared to peace of soul? First identify what is fundamental:

Examine your heart often to see if it is such toward your neighbuor as you would like his to be toward you were you in his place. This is the touchstone of true reason.

And don't kid yourself. (Maybe the first rule of Lent is "don't kid yourself.")

We all colour devotion according to our own likings and dispositions. One man sets great value on fasting, and believes himself to be leading a very devout life, so long as he fasts rigorously, although the while his heart is full of bitterness — and while he will not moisten his lips with wine, perhaps not even with water, in his great abstinence, he does not scruple to steep them in his neighbour's blood through slander and detraction.

PRAYERS STRAIGHT FROM THE BIBLE - PSALMS:

An ancient tradition of the Church involves the meditation during Lent on seven Psalms, called the "Penitential Psalms" because of their spiritual themes of penance and conversion. It is believed that the designation of these Psalms as "penitential" began way back in the 7th century and has persisted ever since.

Below is the beginning of each Psalm, expressing the sorrow within a person's heart for sins against God's goodness:

Psalm 6 - Do not reprove me in your anger, Lord, nor punish me in your wrath. Have pity on me, Lord, for I am weak; Heal me, Lord, for my bones are shuddering...

Psalm 32 - Blessed is the one whose fault is removed, whose sin is forgiven. Blessed is the man to whom the Lord imputes no guilt, in whose spirit is no deceit. Because I kept silent, my bones wasted away; I groaned all day long. For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength withered as in dry summer heat....

Psalm 38 - Lord, do not punish me in your anger; in your wrath do not chastise me! Your arrows have sunk deep in me; your hand has come down upon me. There is no wholesomeness in my flesh because of your anger; there is no health in my bones because of my sin. My iniquities overwhelm me, a burden too heavy for me....

Psalm 51 - Have mercy on me, God, in accord with your merciful love; in your abundant compassion blot out my transgressions. Thoroughly wash away my guilt; and from my sin cleanse me. For I know my transgressions; my sin is always before me. Against you, you alone have I sinned; I have done what is evil in your eyes...

Psalm 102 - Lord, hear my prayer; let my cry come to you. Do not hide your face from me in the day of my distress. Turn your ear to me; when I call, answer me quickly. For my days vanish like smoke; my bones burn away as in a furnace....

Psalm 130 - Out of the depths I call to you, Lord; Lord, hear my cry! May your ears be attentive to my cry for mercy. If you, Lord, keep account of sins, Lord, who can stand? But with you is forgiveness and so you are revered

Psalm 143 - Lord, hear my prayer; in your faithfulness listen to my pleading; answer me in your righteousness. Do not enter into judgment with your servant; before you no one can be just. The enemy has pursued my soul; he has crushed my life to the ground.... (Psalm translation from New American Bible with Hebrew numbering.)
