Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

Sacramental Life - St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

Sacrament of Reconciliation - Saturdays 4 - 4:30 p.m., or by appointment.

Marriage - For registered and supporting members, please contact the parish office at least one year in advance of your date.

Becoming Catholic - Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, preparing adults for baptism and/or to join the community. Please contact the office for further information.

Anointing and Pastoral Care - Our parish community cares about the sick and elderly and the lonely. Please notify the parish office to arrange for them to receive the Annointing of the Sick, or to have the Holy Communion brought to them.

Pastoral Care to those in Hospital - A family member is asked to contact the parish whenever a parishioner is in hospital and requests a pastoral visit, or Sacrament of the Sick (Annointing).

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Reflection on the First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

At the end of Easter season, two events occur: Jesus' appearances cease, and the community is animated by the Spirit. The four Gospels deal with these two events in different ways. In Matthew, Jesus commissions His disciples on a mountain in Galilee and promises to stay with them (Mt 28:16-20). Jesus' Ascension is found in Mark's "Longer Ending" (Mk 16:1-20). John's Gospel records a final encounter in Galilee, but it refers to Jesus' return, not His departure (Jn 21:1-25). Luke concludes his Gospel (Lk 24:50-53) and begins the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 1:6-12) with two slightly different descriptions of Jesus' Ascension. Regarding the Spirit, Jesus imparts the Spirit at the Last Supper in John; Matthew and Mark imply that Jesus' "Spirit" remains active among the eleven; and Luke provides a dramatic Pentecost descent of the Spirit in the Acts of the Apostles. It is the first event, Jesus' definitive departure and its consequences, that we celebrate today.

Preparing for His Ascension, Jesus replies to the disciples question about the restoration of the "kingdom of Israel" by gradually moving them from knowledge to mission. Knowledge, is not given to them and belongs only to the Father. Instead, they will be empowered by the Spirit to give witness to Jesus in Jerusalem and beyond, "to the ends of the earth."

As Jesus departs from their sight, two men in white appear. This recalls other appearances of heavenly beings, at the empty tomb and at the Transfiguration. The two men in white at the Transfiguration were Moses and Elijah, who, according to tradition, were taken up into heaven to make way for their successors (Joshua and Elisha, respectively). Similarly, now that Jesus has ascended, His successors (the disciples) can be empowered through the Spirit for their mission to go out into the world to be Jesus' witnesses. The Story of Our Lady of Fatima - Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese children– Francisco and Jacinta Marto and their cousin Lucia dos Santos–received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria near Fatima, a city 110 miles north of Lisbon. Mary asked



the children to pray the rosary for world peace, for the end of World War I, for sinners, and for the

conversion of Russia. When Lucia grew up she became a Carmelite nun and died in 2005 at the age of 97. The feast of Our Lady of Fatima was approved by the local bishop in 1930 and added to the Church's worldwide calendar in 2002.

Reflection - The message of Fatima is simple: Pray.

Mary is perfectly honored when people generously imitate her response "*Let it be done to me as you say*" (Luke 1:38). Mary can never be seen as a rival to Jesus, or to the Church's teaching authority, as exercised by the college of bishops united with the bishop of Rome. (*From franciscanmedia.com*)

Saint Matthias' Story - According to Acts 1:15-26, during the days after the Ascension Peter stood up in the midst of the brothers—about 120 of Jesus' followers. Now that Judas had betrayed his ministry, it was necessary, Peter said, to fulfill the scriptural recommendation that another should take his office. *"Therefore, it is necessary that one of the men who accompanied us the whole time the Lord Jesus came and went among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day on which he was taken up from us, become with us a witness to his resurrection"* (Acts 1:21-22).

They nominated two men: Joseph Barsabbas and Matthias. They prayed and drew lots. The choice fell upon Matthias, who was added to the Eleven. Matthias is not mentioned by name anywhere else in the New Testament.

<u>Reflection</u> - What was the holiness of Matthias? Obviously, he was suited for apostleship by the experience of being with Jesus from His baptism to His ascension. He must also have been suited personally, or he would not have been nominated for so great a responsibility. Must we not remind ourselves that the fundamental holiness of Matthias was his receiving gladly the relationship with the Father offered him by Jesus and completed by the Holy Spirit? If the apostles are the foundations of our faith by their witness, they must also be reminders, if only implicitly, that holiness is entirely a matter of God's giving, and it is offered to all, in the everyday circumstances of life. We receive, and even for this God supplies the power of freedom. *(From franciscanmedia.com)*
