

The First Reading from Acts 1:1-11

The Acts of the Apostles opens with the announcement that this book is intended to be a sequel to the Gospel of Luke. While the Gospel told the story of Jesus' life, ministry, passion, death, resurrection and ascension during His time on earth, Acts turns to the mission bestowed upon the Apostles to witness to Jesus' Resurrection and to make believers of all the nations. Luke's Gospel ends with an extremely brief depiction of Jesus' Ascension. In Acts, Luke provides more details: Apostles were instructed to remain together in Jerusalem for several days before they would be "baptised with the Holy Spirit". The risen Lord diligently prepares His followers for the work of continuing His mission. He offers them "many convincing proofs" during the forty days following His Resurrection, enlightening them about the kingdom of God. Apostles are failing to truly understand the Lord's teaching, as they question Him on the possibility of restoring the kingdom of Israel rather than God's kingdom. Jesus gently corrects and refocuses them. The Holy Spirit will enable them to build up the Kingdom of God. Through the instruction of Jesus. Luke tells us that the mission will be rooted in Jerusalem and Judea, then will go out to the partially Jewish region of Samaria, and even extend beyond, "to the ends of the earth." This order guides the growth and mission of the Church in Acts.

Jesus' Ascension, in the Acts, concludes with His being "lifted up" in the midst of a cloud with the Apostles looking on. The dramatic portrayal is meant to bring to an end the earthly work of Jesus so that the ministry may begin anew under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. "Two men in the white robes" who observe the Apostle's reaction, inform the Apostles that Jesus will someday return just as He departed. It is a call to action for the Apostles, and there is an urgency with which they are to testify to the glorified Lord.

PRAYERS STRAIGHT FROM THE BIBLE - CANTICLES:

The humble hope in God, rejoice in Him - The canticle of Anna (Hannah), the mother of Samuel (1 Sam 2:1-10). Among many OT Canticles this one is used for Morning Prayer (Lauds) on Wednesdays.

My heart exults in the Lord; my strength is exalted in my God. My mouth derides my enemies, because I rejoice in my victory.

There is no Holy One like the Lord, no one besides you; there is no Rock like our God. Talk no more so very proudly, let not arrogance come from your mouth; for the Lord is a God of knowledge, and by Him actions are weighed. The bows of the mighty are broken, but the feeble gird on strength. Those who were full have hired themselves out for bread, but those who were hungry are fat with spoil.

The barren has borne seven, but she who has many children is forlorn. The Lord kills and brings to life; He brings down to Sheol and raises up. The Lord makes poor and makes rich; He brings low, He also exalts.

He raises up the poor from the dust; He lifts the needy from the ash heap, to make them sit with princes and inherit a seat of honour.

For the pillars of the earth are the Lord's, and on them He has set the world. He will guard the feet of His faithful ones, but the wicked shall be cut off in darkness; for not by might does one prevail.

The Lord! His adversaries shall be shattered; the Most High will thunder in heaven. The Lord will judge the ends of the earth; He will give strength to His king, and exalt the power of his anointed.

Anna sung this cantilcle after offering her child, the little Samuel to the Lord. He was to be a prophet in Israel and his action was to mark the transition of the Hebrew people to a new form of government, monarchy, in which the unfortunate King Saul and the glorious King David would play the lead. Anna had a history of suffering in her past, for, as the story says, the Lord "had closed her womb".

In ancient Israel, a barren woman was considered as a withered branch, in part because she prevented her husband from having continuity in the memory of the generations to follow, an important factor in what was a hazy and uncertain vision of the hereafter.

But Anna had put her trust in the God of life and prayed: "O Lord of hosts, if you will indeed look on the affliction of your maidservant and remember me and not forget your maidservant, but will give your maidservant a son, then I will give him to the Lord all the days of his life". And God heard the cry of this humiliated woman and gave her Samuel: a living shoot that sprang from the dry trunk; what had been impossible in human eyes had become a tangible reality in that child who was to be consecrated to the Lord.

The hymn of thanksgiving that sprang from the lips of the mother was to be taken up and expressed anew by another Mother, Mary, who while remaining a virgin conceived by the power of the Spirit of God. In fact, in the Magnificat of the Mother of Jesus we can perceive an echo of Anna's canticle which for this reason is known as "the Magnificat of the Old Testament".

There are two themes that express Anna's feelings. The first will also be dominant in Mary's Magnificat: it is the reversal of destinies that God brings about. This is a profession of faith spoken by both mothers before the Lord of history, who arrays himself to defend the least, the poor and the suffering, the offended and humiliated.

The other theme is connected even more closely with Anna: "The barren has born seven, but she who has many children is forlorn". The Lord who reverses destinies is also at the root of life and of death. Anna's sterile womb was like a tomb; yet God was able to make it bring forth life, because "in His hand is the life of every living thing and the breath of all mankind". At this point hope does not only concern the life of the child who is born, but also the life God can bring back after death. (From John Paul II, General Audience, Wed. 20 March 2002)
