

### Reflection on the First Reading: Isaiah 25: 6- 10a

Isaiah 24 to 27 constitutes what scholars call the "Apocalypse of Isaiah," which concludes ten chapters of prophesies on the future of various nations. Although Isaiah has prophesied that Israel has lost favour with God and will witness the destruction of Jerusalem, he is clear that nations at odds with Israel will also be subject to God's judgment. Chapter 24 compares Jerusalem to a vine that is withering away, and yet there is hope that Israel's repentance will result in God's forgiveness.

In chapter 25, which our reading is from today, we read about a sense of universal eschatology. The Lord will welcome people from every nation to this mountain with a feast of abundant joy. After the Lord has destroyed all that is evil in the world, including the ultimate enemy found in death, He will gather to His holy place all those who heard His voice and turned from their wicked ways.

> Isaiah says that God will destroy "the shroud that is cast over all people." This "shroud," that he also calls "the Sheet," is 🔊 an allusion to death. In the past, all peoples were tangled in the powers of death, but now God will not only destroy death, but he will take away all pain and

suffering; all the toils and struggles, the "tears" and the "disgrace" experienced by His people will be no more. We may assume that the words "His people" has expanded to include representatives from every nation and not simply from Israel alone.

The passage concludes with a chorus of voices heralding the presence and power of God "for whom we have waited." At the end time, when this power of God is revealed, it will indeed be a cause for joy among all peoples who have recognized the truth of God and followed Him.

### Saint Ignatius of Antioch's Story (d. c. 107)

Born in Syria, Ignatius converted to Christianity and eventually became bishop of Antioch. In the year 107, Emperor Trajan visited Antioch and forced the Christians there to choose between death and apostasy. Ignatius would not deny Christ and thus was condemned to be put to death in Rome.

Ignatius is well known for the seven letters he wrote on the long journey from Antioch to Rome. Five of these letters are to churches in Asia Minor; they urge the Christians there to remain faithful to God and to obey their superiors. He warns them against heretical doctrines, providing them with the solid truths of the Christian faith.

The sixth letter was to Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, who was later martyred for the faith. The final letter begs the Christians in Rome not to try to stop his martyrdom. "The only thing I ask of you is to allow me to offer the libation of my blood to God. I am the wheat of the Lord; may I be ground by the teeth of the beasts to become the immaculate bread of Christ." Ignatius bravely met the lions in the Circus Maximus.

**Reflection:** Ignatius' great concern was for the unity and order of the Church. Even greater was his willingness to suffer martyrdom rather than deny Christ. He did not draw attention to his own suffering, but to the love of God which strengthened him. He knew the price of commitment and would not deny Christ, even to save his own life. 
packed with insight.

### History of the Rosary & St. Dominic

Tradition tells us that the beginnings of the Rosary came from the time of St. Dominic and the occasion of the Albigensian heresy which ravaged Christendom, especially the southern France during the latter part of the 12th and the beginning of the 13th centuries. St. Dominic was distressed at his lack of success in his preaching in countering this heresy, and in his desperation turned to the Mother of God for help. She appeared to him and told him to use her Psalter in conjunction with his preaching of the mysteries of our salvation, as an instrument in combatting the great heresy of his day.

From time immemorial the 150 psalms of the Bible comprised the most important part of the official liturgical prayers prayed by the clergy and the monks in monasteries. Since, however, many of the common folk were illiterate, there was an attempt to offer those who could not read a substitute for the 150 psalms. The practice arose of substituting 150 *Our Fathers* in place of the psalms, using a string of beads to count them, dividing them into "fifties". This chaplet, or string of beads, came to be known as "*Paternoster*" beads. Little by little, the *Hail Mary* took its place along side the *Creed* and the *Our Father* as a standard prayer. In the course of time there came to be a parallel Psalter, i.e., one of 150 *Hail Marys* known as the *Marian Psalter*.

St. Dominic was an ardent promoter of the Marian Psalter, which later was called the Rosary, since he preferred a form of preaching upon the mysteries of the life, passion and death, and resurrection of Christ - alternated with the Psalter of Hail Marys. The particular mysteries that he preached were successful at countering the Albigensian heresy. (The Albigensian heresy is a belief that there are two supreme beings, a good God who created the spirit world, and an evil god who created the material world. The spiritual world is essentially good, and the material world (including the human body) is essentially evil. The evil god (Satan) imprisoned spirits in material bodies, so whatever one can do to be released from that prison (including suicide) is good. Since matter is evil, marriage and the procreation of mankind is evil. The proponents of this heresy rejected Catholic belief regarding the Trinity, the Incarnation, the sacraments, hell and purgatory, but believed in the transmigration of souls. Christ was not truly a man, nor therefore, was Mary truly the Mother of God. The crucifixion, death and resurrection of Christ were only illusions, and the whole concept of the cross in the Christian life was rejected.) (From rosarycenter.org)
