

A Word From Our Pastor:

Any of us have family traditions regarding putting up a Christmas tree. It may involve a family gathering to pick up and purchase a fresh Christmas tree. Perhaps a family may have a traditional routine about who will decorate the tree. Some families may have designated a specific time in Advent to put up the tree. In my own family, my parents would specifically wait until the last week of Advent to put up our family tree. As a child, I felt disappointed because I had to wait when it seemed as though everyone else already had their trees up for several weeks. My opinion changed when I entered the seminary, when I would not be finished until around the 15th of December. Coming home for the holidays, I would put up and decorate the family tree. I came to the realization of the importance of Advent and to patiently waiting.

I never realized the history of the Christmas tree until recently. The origins bean with St. Boniface in 723. According to legend, he was trying to convert a Norse tribe in what is now Northern Germany. To show that Christ was more powerful than their Norse gods, St. Boniface chopped down the pagans' ancient sacred tree 'Thor's Oak'. There, growing in the roots of the tree, was the seedling of a fir tree. St. Boniface used this as a symbol of Christianity, saying that just as the boughs of the fir tree remain green throughout the year, and its top points to heaven, Christ should be their constant light.

The custom of Christmas trees here in North America came from England during the 1800's. A woodcut print of Queen Victoria and the Royal Family around their Christmas tree became very popular. It was so popular that by the 1870's almost every house in North America had a Christmas tree.

I bring up these images of the Christmas tree, because we have one of the most famous passages in the Advent season in our readings this week. Today from Isaiah we read that "a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse." Isaiah wrote to give hope to the dejected people of Israel. He wrote of Jesse, the father of David, as the beginning of the House of David from whom the Messiah would come. Although Isaiah spoke of the end of that line as the stump, the roots of that stump were still lining and from those roots would come a sprout: the Messiah.

A Christmas tree helps bring joy to this season, especially if it involves family traditions. Our preparations for Christ would bring beauty and joy, not just for Christmas, but for all time. As we put up our own trees, perhaps we might ponder what this beauty and joy might bring to us.
