

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR:

or the last three Sundays we have read from the Gospel of St. Mtthew of how Jesus was criticizing the leaders of the people for their failure to listen to God and for misleading the priorities of God's way of life.

This Sunday in the Gospel passage we see how the tables have turned against Jesus. The leaders, having taken offense, begin attempting to destroy Jesus or at least discrediting Him in the eyes of the people. However, Jesus takes their challenge and once again reminds everyone of God's supremacy.

One of the many criticisms which people have with our modern-day government is regarding taxes. With inflation and the high cost of living, governments quickly will raise taxes to increase government revenue. I personally question taxes being implemented on vices which can make people become addicted to certain things. We know these as being 'sin taxes'. They seem to be justified by any government at the expense of the well being of the people.

The people of Jesus' day were also upset at the taxes which were levied against them. There were income taxes, but the people were really upset with what was called the 'census tax' which was levied on every man, woman, and slave from age 12 to 65 just for the privilege of living in the Roman Empire. The amount was roughly the equivalent of a full day's wage for a worker.

This tax was a political and spiritual sore point to the people. The Pharisees resented Roman rule and Caesar being proclaimed divine. The Herodians were loyal to Herod Antipas, the governor put in place by the Empire, so they were seen as Roman sympathizers.

The only thing that united the two groups was their dislike for Jesus. The trap they set was meant to force Jesus into taking a side. If Jesus opposed the tax, He could be seen as an enemy of the Romans. If Jesus sided with the Herodians, He would turn most of the people against Himself. Jesus did not directly answer the question He was asked. Instead, He changed the topic from a problem of political discontent to a statement about God.

With all the conflict that existed in Jesus' day, the one aspect of life that was taking second seat was God. It was becoming a question of who was serving who. Jesus was basically saying that people were worried about giving Caesar what is his, while ignoring giving God what was due to Him.

Like the Pharisees, we can allow too many things to distract us from the point of faith, God loves us, and we owe God both praise and worship. Some can be like the Herodians and make concessions to others to get what they want. This can make a person compromise their core values and beliefs.

It is vey easy to worry about 'what is ours', and to fail to be concerned with 'what is God's'. By remaining steadfast in our faith, at home and in public life, we show that our reward is not to be sought in this world. Our treasures are given to us to serve God, for we must remember that the coins of our lives belong to God in the first place.
