

A Word From Our Pastor:

ur second reading of this Sunday from the letter of St. Paul to the Philippians, gives us an insight into an early Christian community. Philippi, located in Northern Greece, was a Roman colony which had become a location for veterans of the Roman Legions to live. Philippi was not a place of commerce but had become basically an early retirement community. Historians believe that Philippi was the first Christian community in Europe.

St. Paul, and his companion Silas, came to Philippi to spread the Good News to the people. The reaction of the people was not particularly positive or welcoming, in fact, both men were imprisoned in Philippi. What is most important here is that the fledgling Philippian Christian community came to their aid. The community supported Paul in many ways, physically, financially, and spiritually. Thus, the letter from Paul to them, which we read today, was for the most part a 'thank you' letter.

This letter has been called "The Letter of Joy" as Paul understandably had a special affection for the Christian community at Philippi. There were numerous divisions within the community, and this brought great heartache to St Paul, who spoke of the need to unify and for the people to improve their relationships with one another.

St. Paul said that the way to see and achieve unity was to look at the person of Christ. St. Paul challenges the Philippians to build a community of faith. To achieve this goal the people were to share in the mind of Christ beginning with an attitude of humility.

Paul asked the Philippians, as he also asks us, to choose the way of Christ in humility and to do nothing out of selfishness. Paul reminded the people that Christ 'emptied' himself to become fully human. He never ceased to be divine, but by choice, He set aside power and privilege.

God calls us to be united in Christ. This is what Paul wanted for the Philippians. We must be sure we know the mind of Christ. To know Christ's mind we must be with the community of faith when Christ speaks.
