

Acts 2:14, 22-28; Psalm 16; 1 Peter 1:17-21; Luke 24:13-35

Brantford, St. Pius X Parish, Sunday morning, sometime in the late 1970s, I took a few minutes to sit in the pew before the tabernacle before Mass was ready to begin to pray and center myself.

And then, it was time for Mass to begin. It was an ordinary Sunday. The music was good but not much different than we had every Sunday. Nothing special was being celebrated and nothing extraordinary was happening. And yet, something happened. I can't really explain it to you except to say that somewhere toward the end of the Mass, the curtain, the veil that had been obscuring Christ's presence among us, was pulled back. Almost everyone cried --- all four hundred plus --- overwhelmed by the presence of the one who was always there just out of sight and touch. People left church that Sunday in stunned silence, trying to let the experience of what had happen sink in their minds and hearts.

This Sunday Luke tells us the beautiful story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. Only one has a name, Cleopas. Perhaps, Cleopas' companion was his wife; we just don't know. Clearly, they are sad. The death of their leader, Jesus, has certainly pulled the rug out from under their group and dashed to pieces any dreams they may have had. They were walking without hope. Those of us who read the story as bystanders from afar may wonder how they could have missed what Jesus had told them about his death and resurrection. They were at the disadvantage of being too close to the situation to get any objectivity or to arrive at another perspective. This is the same thing that happened to Jesus in his earthly life. People could not accept that he came from God because they knew he came from Nazareth and lived with his mother, Mary and father, Joseph, who was a carpenter.

When Jesus joins the couple on the road, the same thing happens again. He is too close for them to recognize him.

always think he is joking and playing with them when he prods them with questions that clearly he knows the answer to. And then, finally, their eyes were opened as he explained the scriptures to them and broke bread with him.

And, so here we are, two thousand years later, on our Like the disciples on the road to own roads to somewhere. Emmaus, we too may be too close at times to recognize the presence of Christ walking with us on our journeys. Yet, we have available to us the same tools, the same keys of Scripture and the Eucharist, to help us unlock the door of understanding and pull back the veil over our eyes so that we can see. St. Augustine said that ignorance of scripture is ignorance of Christ; or in a more positive way, the more we read and pray on the sacred texts of God's revealed word, the more we will come to know and recognize Christ and the love of God who surrounds us. And for us, as Roman Catholics, we have been gifted with the promised and covenanted gift of Christ's presence in the Eucharist. Although we believe God is present everywhere and at all times, in the sacraments --- and most especially the Eucharist --- we have a 100% God-guaranteed place of encounter. Why would we not want this chance? This is certainly better odds than a lottery gives US.

And if we commit ourselves to this journey, to walking on the road with a stranger who joins us, who knows what may happen on any given ordinary Sunday? Perhaps, the veil hiding Christ's presence from our eyes and preventing us from recognizing him may be pulled back just enough to give us a glimpse of heaven and the life to come. We'll never know unless we head down the road.
