GOSPEL REFLECTION

...and he had compassion for them

According to the pattern set by David, a shepherd boy whom the Lord chose to be king, Israelite kings were meant to be shepherds of their people. Recent rulers had grievously failed in this role and allowed "the flock" to be destroyed and scattered (in exile). For Jeremiah, the task of the coming righteous "Branch of David" will be that of gathering the exiles and healing a severely wounded people. The Christian reading of Old Testament passages such as these obviously understood them with respect to Jesus in a fully messianic sense. Hence the presentation of him as compassionate Shepherd King that we find in the gospels. They point not merely to a coming ruler of David's line who would be an improvement upon those recently in power, but to a ruler who would be God's instrument in bringing about a far more radical renewal.

In today's Gospel, the disciples have returned full of enthusiasm for the success of their healing and teaching activity. These are the early days in the ministry of Jesus when he is widely popular, with people flocking to him on all sides for healing and instruction. It is a popularity that will soon fall away—and turn, in the end, to hostility. Perhaps it is precisely because of his awareness that the disciples could be carried away by all the enthusiasm that Jesus attempts to take them away to be alone with himself for a while. They cannot be bearers of healing and liberation without themselves constantly tapping the life-giving source of the capacity to do so.

But, as in that earlier instance (1:36-39), the attempt to find some rest and peace is not successful. While Jesus and the disciples seek to escape in a boat - always a symbol of the Church in Mark - the enthusiastic crowds follow on foot and are there waiting for Jesus as soon as he disembarks. So, we are presented with the image of the Shepherd-Messiah who is overcome with compassion. The underlying Greek expression splangchnistheis has the sense of being moved with emotion to the depth of one's being - literally, to one's entrails. We are invited to look out upon the people through the eyes of Jesus: to see them as sheep without a shepherd scattered and leaderless.

The Church's pastoral and teaching ministry is simply an extension of this pastoral compassion of Jesus. Like the disciples with Jesus in the boat, those who minister in his name learn here to look out through his eyes upon those to whom they are sent. (Reflection excerpted from: Fr. First Millennial Saint

Pope Francis and the Consistory of Cardinals voted to approve the canonization of the first Saint from Generation Y, those born between 1981 and 1996 commonly known as millennials. Blessed Carlo Acutis will likely be proclaimed a Saint during the 2025 Jubilee, possibly along with other canonizations. Born to Italian parents in London, England, in 1991, Blessed Carlo was a web designer who died from leukemia at the age of 15 in Monza, Italy. He was known for his devotion to Eucharistic miracles and Marian apparitions, which he catalogued on a website he designed.

According to the *Peroratio*, Blessed Carlo was "welcoming and caring towards the poorest, and

he helped the homeless, the needy, and immigrants with the money he saved from his weekly allowance." A healing



miracle has been attributed to him.

Virtual Faith Formation Courses

As part of an ongoing collaboration with the Archdiocese of Toronto's Office of Formation for Discipleship, the University of Dayton in Ohio has released several new courses in conjunction with its Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF) program. Now open for registration are 41 distinct and unique programs for faith formation, all of which are designed to increase and enhance students' development in their Catholic faith. Each five-week Cycle 6 course will run from September 2nd to October 6th, with applications starting now and closing August 28th. Courses available for registration include Bible basics, introduction to pastoral care, introduction to liturgy, New and Old Testament studies, praying with children, theological reflection and Church history. The courses are offered in English, Spanish and Arabic. As members of the Archdiocese of Toronto, parishioners pay discounted course fees of \$50 each (less than half).
