Meditations on Holy Mass Fourth Sunday in Advent (Year C) 22 December 2024

First reading: Micah 5.2-5a

From you, O Bethlehem, will come the ruler of Israel. Second reading: Hebrews 10.5-10 CCC 606; 2568; 488

I come to do your will.

Gospel: Luke 1.39-45 CCC 2675, 2676, 2677; 148

Why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes

to me?

The *first reading*, speaks in prophecy of the coming Redeemer, the Messiah. God's servant, his anointed, will begin his mission of salvation in the land that had first fallen victim to destruction by foreign conquest. This saving mission is intimately bound up with the motherhood of Mary, the new Eve, by means of the Incarnation and the Cross. In his Gospel, St. Luke portrays Mary, mother of the Church, as she who brings Christ to others. Elizabeth acknowledges her cousin as, "the mother of my Lord" and announces her own belief "that there would be a fulfillment" of the Biblical prophecies. The second reading affirms this connection between Mary's motherhood and our redemption, "it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ", a body formed in the Virgin's womb.

Before Mass: O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death. (Vespers, O Antiphon 21 Dec.)

After Mass: Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. (Lauds)

Later in the day: O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust. (Vespers, O Antiphon 22 Dec.) *****

Meditations on Holy Mass Christmas Day (Years ABC) 25 December 2024

First reading: Isaiah 52.7-10

All the ends of the earth have seen the victory of our God. **Second reading:** Hebrews 1.1-6 CCC 65, 65*, 102*, 241, 320

In these last days God has spoken to us by the Son. **Gospel:** John 1.1-5,9-14 CCC 241, 291, 530, 526* The Word became flesh and lived among us.

The *first reading* reveals that all peoples on earth are offered redemption from slavery to sin. This prophecy looks to *the Gospel*, in which St. John proclaims that "to all who received" the promised redeemer "he gave power to become children of God." In the *second reading*, the sacred writer declares the divinity of Christ: "Let all God's Angels worship him." God is ever-faithful to his promises, and he gives us the power to become one with him. For our part, we must respond with a sincere conversion from sin and turn towards self-sacrificing love for God and neighbour. Sin turns us inwards and isolates us. Charity joins us to all peoples on earth. It is God's free gift of grace that frees us from isolation and bitterness.

Before Mass: When the sun rises in the morning sky, you will see the King of Kings coming forth from the Father like a bridegroom from the bridal chamber. (First Vespers)

After Mass: Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those he favours, alleluia. (Lauds)

Later in the day: Christ the Lord is born today; today, the Saviour has appeared. Earth echoes songs of angel choirs, archangels' joyful praise. Today on earth his friends exult: Glory to God in the highest, alleluia. (Second Vespers)

World Day of Peace January 1

The World Day of Peace was established by Pope Paul VI in 1968 who asked that "every year, this commemoration be repeated as a hope and as a promise, at the beginning of the calendar which measures and outlines the path of human life in time, that Peace with its just and beneficent equilibrium may dominate the development of events to come." Each year has a specific theme, chosen by the Holy Father.

2025 Theme

Forgive us our trespasses: grant us your peace

Only from a genuine conversion on all levels - personal, local and international – will true peace be able to flourish. Peace comes not only from an end to conflicts, but also in a new reality in which wounds are healed and each person's dignity is recognized. Inspired by Pope Francis's encyclical letters and above all by the concepts of Hope and Forgiveness, which are at the heart of the Jubilee Year 2025, this is a time for conversion that calls us not to condemn, but instead to bring about reconciliation and peace.

Meditations on Holy Mass The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph 29 December 2024

First reading: Sirach 3.2-6, 12-14 CCC 2218 Those who respect the Lord honour their parents.

Second reading: Colossians 3.12-21 CCC 815, 1827, 1844; 2633;

2641; 2286, 1807 Family life in the Lord.

Gospel: Luke 2.41-52 CCC 583

His parents found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers.

The first reading announces that all authority comes from God, "The Lord honours a father" ... "and he confirms a mother's rights." God freely uses parents and others to accomplish his holy will, namely, to make our happiness possible through human co-operation. In the Gospel, St. Luke shows Christ's uniqueness: "all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers." Yet, Jesus went down with Mary and Joseph "and was obedient to them." Jesus is God and is thus infinitely beyond his human parents, but the Father's purpose demanded the Son's humble obedience. In the second reading, St. Paul locates family relationships in Christ, instructing us, "forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." The relationship of wives to husbands and husbands to their wives and the obedience of children to their parents — all these are directed at our redemption. In God's plan, humble obedience is restorative, quite unlike human structures of superiority and power.

Before Mass: The child Jesus remained in Jerusalem, and his parents did not know it. They thought he was in the group of travelers and looked for him among their relatives and friends. (First Vespers)

After Mass: Lord, give us light through the example of your family and guide our feet into the way of peace. (Lauds)

Later in the day: Son, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety. Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house? (Second Vespers)

Meditations on Holy Mass Mary, the Holy Mother of God 1 January 2025

First reading: Numbers 6.22-27

They shall put my name on the children of Israel, and I will bless them.

Second reading: Galatians 4.4-7 CCC 422, 683, 693, 793

God sent his Son, born of a woman.

Gospel: Luke 2.16-21 CCC 724*, 2599*, 527*

They found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. After

eight days he was named Jesus.

In the *first reading*, the sacred author reveals that in Christ we become adopted children of God. God's name is on us, as the title "Christian" reflects. This revelation foreshadows the *Gospel*, in which St. Luke presents the name of Mary's child as "Jesus," a name that means our Saviour. In the *second reading*, St. Paul sees the birth of God the Son in human flesh as linked to our kinship, through Jesus, to God the Father. This kinship is the foundation of our freedom from sin and death. Only an infinite Redeemer could make satisfaction on behalf of mere creatures for sin. Sin always brings harm to the sinner and is always an offence against an infinitely good Creator.

Before Mass: In his great love for us, God has sent his Son in the likeness of our sinful nature, born of a woman and subject to the Law, alleluia. (First Vespers)

After Mass: Marvelous is the mystery proclaimed today: man's nature is made new as God becomes man; he remains what he was and becomes what he was not. Yet each nature stays distinct and for ever undivided. (Lauds)

Later in the day: Blessed is the womb that bore you, O Christ, and the breast that nursed you, Lord and Saviour of the world, alleluia. (Second Vespers)

Meditations on Holy Mass Epiphany of the Lord (Years ABC) 5 January 2025

First reading: Isaiah 60.1-6

The glory of the Lord has risen upon you. **Second reading:** Ephesians 3.2-3a, 5-6

Now the mystery has been revealed: now the Gentiles have become

fellow heirs of the promise.

Gospel: Matthew 2.1-12 CCC 486*, 528* 724*

We have come from the East to pay homage to the king.

In the *first reading*, the Prophet reveals that, "Nations shall come to your light." That is, in Christ Jesus, salvation has come to all the peoples of the earth. This looks to the *Gospel*, in which St. Matthew shows us the adoration of the Wise Men. These pagan worshippers represent all the nations of the earth, adoring the Christ Child, Son of God and son of David. In the *second reading*, St. Paul teaches us that all peoples are equal in Christ, for all are equally offered the gift of Baptism and redemption from sin.

Before Mass: Seeing the star, the wise men said: This must signify the birth of some great king. Let us search for him and lay our treasures at his feet: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. (First Vespers)

After Mass: Today the Church has been joined to her heavenly bridegroom, since Christ has purified her of her sins in the river Jordan: the Magi hasten to the royal wedding and offer gifts: the wedding guests rejoice since Christ has changed water into wine, alleluia. (Lauds)

Later in the day: Three wonders mark this day we celebrate: today the star led the Magi to the manger; today water was changed into wine at the marriage feast; today Christ desired to be baptized by John in the river Jordan to bring us salvation, alleluia. (Second Vespers)
