# The Friar's Nook

The fourth gift of the Holy Spirit is Fortitude. Fortitude denotes a firmness of mind in doing good and in avoiding evil, particularly when it is difficult or dangerous to do so, and the confidence to overcome all obstacles, even deadly ones, by virtue of the assurance of everlasting life. Stand up for what is right, even if it means facing rejection, abuse, or harm. Choose what is morally right. Persist in pursuing what is right and good. Patiently endure suffering. Conquer sin and grow in goodness.

The gift of Fortitude is something we often don't even think about. But that doesn't mean we don't use it. When I was in fifth grade, I was walking to my Cub Scout meeting after school. Three boys decided to pick on me. I didn't even know who they were, but they eventually knocked me down and started punching me. As I was trying to protect myself, each of them was pulled off of me by a big sixth grader who I knew by name but was sure he didn't know me. He said sternly "Leave him alone!" Then he asked if I was OK. I said yes and he left. All I could think of was how he saved me from being beaten up and then walked away like the Lone Ranger! His Fortitude enabled him to take on three kids who could have turned on him, yet his firmness made them run away. Something in me changed that day. Whenever I saw somebody being picked on after that, I always interceded and stood up for them.

Pope Francis says about the gift of Fortitude: "A Christian without courage, who does not turn his own strength to good, who does not bother anyone, is a useless Christian." With the gift of fortitude, we don't have to worry about what other people think or do but simply concern ourselves with what God thinks and doing what is right and good. It helps no one if we think about doing the right thing but don't do it. We need to rely on the Spirit's gift of Fortitude to cast out our own fears of what might happen to us. As Jesus taught us it's not all about us but rather about the good we can do for others helping our brothers and sisters especially those who are weaker than us. That's the guidance of the 10 commandments. That's the direction of the beatitudes.

Don't talk yourself out of doing good, any good, for fear of how people will look at you or think about you, or in fact fear of what people may do to you. Jesus came as an example and he gave his life for us. I can say with some degree of surety that we probably won't be crucified in this life so we should do whatever we can relying on the Wisdom of the Spirit and using the Fortitude of the Spirit to act whenever we can.

This Christmas go and be Christ for all those who need him,

#### Wrapped in Swaddling Clothes: the Sacrificial Lamb without Blemish

Finding a firstborn son wrapped in swaddling cloth and lying in a manger would have significance for the shepherds. It was customary for the shepherds to choose the firstborn lamb of the flock as a sacrificial offering for their sins at the temple. In order for it to be without blemish, they would wrap it in swaddling cloths and usually lay it in a manger in order to protect it from being trampled. *Jesus is the Lamb without blemish or spot.* (1 Peter 1:19)

**Lying in a Manger: Symbol of the Eucharist** The very name of Jesus' birthplace suggests His title as the Bread of Life. In Hebrew, Bethlehem means, literally, "House of Bread." We look upon the Divine Child lying in the manger - a feeding trough filled with grain. Here, born for us, is the Daily Bread he will himself teach us to pray for everyday of our life. "The manger becomes a reference to the table of God, to which we are invited so as to receive the bread of God," Pope Benedict XVI wrote in *Jesus of Nazareth—The Infancy Narratives*. "From the poverty of Jesus' birth emerges the miracle in which man's redemption is mysteriously accomplished."
