

GOSPEL REFLECTION

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God."

The blessings and woes we hear in today's Gospel mark the perfection of all the wisdom of the Old Testament. That wisdom is summed up with marvellous symmetry in today's First Reading and Psalm: Each declares that the righteous—those who hope in the Lord and delight in His Law-will prosper like a tree planted near living waters. The wicked, who put their "trust in human beings," are cursed to wither and die. Jesus is saying the same thing in the Gospel. The rich and poor are, for Him, more than members of literal economic classes. Their material state symbolizes their spiritual state.

The rich are "the insolent" of today's Psalm, boasting of their self-sufficiency, the strength of their flesh, as Jeremiah says in the First Reading. The poor are the humble, who put all their hope and trust in the Lord.

That's the upside-down world of the Gospel: in poverty, we gain spiritual treasure unimaginable; in suffering and even dying "on account of the Son of Man," we find everlasting life.

The promises of the Old Testament were promises of power and prosperity-in the here and now. The promise of the New Covenant is joy and true freedom even amid the misery and toil of this life. But not only that. As Paul says in today's Epistle, we are to be pitied if our hope is "for this life only."

The words of Jesus are meant to be effective for our lives, not as literature from the distant past to which we listen purely for their historical value. In other words, the teaching of Jesus needs to be adapted to our setting and our particular needs, yet ironically, we all are in need of the same things, as Jesus' first hearers were. We all need to love and be loved without reserve.

Each of us has come into being by God's love. The Beatitudes and their subsequent woes are meant to point us interiorly to the desires of our hearts. We must become more and more aware of what occupies our thinking and desires. Ultimately, wealth or poverty, hunger or satisfaction, worldly praise or persecution do not matter. What matters is that our hearts are detached from the desires identified in this sermon so that we more fully desire only God and His holy will, regardless of the circumstances of life we find ourselves in.
