## FORTIFIED BY THE BREAD OF LIFE

In today's Gospel we discover yet again that one cannot learn something about God without believing in the miraculous, life giving power of Jesus' words and deeds. Yet again, Jesus is pestered by a crowd for explanations and justifications that he is in fact the bread of life. Although I appreciate that it is very human to place empirical knowledge as a precursor to belief, Jesus contextualizes his offer of eternal life in exchange for belief in him. Jesus said to the crowd that their ancestors ate manna from the wilderness and died, however, those who will eat of the bread from heaven will live forever.

Still not convinced of Jesus' offer of bread from heaven? Let's turn to the first reading.

I find Elijah to be a very mysterious biblical figure. Exhausted from his pilgrimage to the mountain of Horeb, he sits under a broom tree and asks the Lord to die. After a sleep, he awakens to an angel nourishing him with cake and water sent by God. In the very next sentence we learn that because of the strength of this food, Elijah was fortified, able to continue his pilgrimage to Horeb wherein

he would receive a special revelation and commission from God.

If the difference between knowledge and belief is that belief contains our hope, then I see hope in how, like Elijah, we are fortified for our earthly pilgrimage through Jesus as the very bread of life! Unlike the bread that Elijah consumed, Jesus promises to sustain us eternally- long after the end of forty days and forty nights.

If we find ourselves wanting more, still hungering for that which does not truly satisfy, then can we claim that we really understand the kind of belief Jesus desires for us? We may find ourselves occasionally hungering for that which does not truly satisfy, but to me, that is all the more reason to reflect on the ways in which we *are* fortified by the Eucharist. For unlike manna in the wilderness, Jesus' bread of life is offered week after week. We do not need fortification for the year ahead, only for seven days until Jesus will nourish us again.

As part of our parish's response to Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment (Laudato Si'), we would like to include specific living things in our Mass intentions, just as we now pray for members of the human community.

We will begin to occassionally introduce a special intention into our intercessory prayers at Mass, related to the season of the year and directed toward a particular creature or form of life in need of prayer at that particular time. We hope that these inclusive prayers will inspire gratitude for nature's gifts and draw us closer to the needs of all living things as fellow creatures of God.

#### STATUS OF CONSTRUCTION

Over the past few weeks, I have heard a few questions and comments about the work being done on the building; and so I thought this might be the best way to address those. In short, all work on the building except the repointing and cleaning of the outer walls is being managed and paid for by the University. This includes the steam to gas climate control conversion as well as the re-roofing of Odette Hall. St. Michael's has been catching up on a great deal of deferred maintenance this summer; and while many have thought this to be at a cost to St. Basil's - it has not.

We have done very well to manage our capital expenses, utilizing volunteers to do many things around the building when we can. As far as the beautification of the church itself is concerned, it has really been a case of "many small (and inexpensive) things make a big difference".

Once the University finishes their portion of the work downstairs, we will begin our renovations to address the kitchen and washrooms as well as other spaces in the basement. What USMC demolished and built, we will clean up as part of our renovations; saving both institutions money. If things work as scheduled (and so far they are), then USMC will install the fan coils in the church itself and finish the pipe work by the end of August. At that time, St. Basil's will begin to clean up and renovate the entire space downstairs. As each space is finished, it will be made available again; with some spaces available in September and then all (hopefully) done by sometime in November.

As I have stated previously, once the fan coils are installed around the second week of August; all work affecting the church space itself will be complete. As for the University projects; most of them will be done by the beginning of September or end of August just before students arrive. As always, if you have questions, please do not hesitate to ask; and thank you for your patience during all these projects!
