
BAPTISMS, WEDDINGS & FUNERALS

Please see the parish website or call the main office for details. Weddings require a one year notice.

Current parish guidelines require parishioners to complete a self-screening at home before coming to the church, and to keep a log of all visits. The University is requiring that visitors to campus, regardless of the purpose of their visit, must be fully vaccinated (provided they are eligible for vaccination). Exemptions to the vaccine requirement must be approved by the University of Toronto.

Students, Faculty, and Staff of the University of Toronto, are required to complete the screening via the University's U-Check tool. Parishioners who are not students, faculty, or staff of the University of Toronto, must use the visitor attestation form available in the narthex.

MAKING SPACE

"Love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return." Simple words for such a big ask! This Sunday's Gospel asks us to create a space in our hearts for our enemies. Maybe the language of 'enemy' is a bit farfetched for us – how many of us could actually pin point individuals that are 'enemies' to us?

At first thought, this language is reminiscent of that which we find in the Lord's Prayer: *"those who trespass against us*". Again, trespass might seem a little too specific a term for what Jesus is really calling us to. It's not just those who would actively seek to undermine us we are called to love – it is also those who are indifferent to us. One of the aspects that makes this difficult for us is the lack of reciprocity necessary for this work. When we talk about the challenges of reconciliation, or welcoming marginal communities into the Church, we are often unable to take up the crucial act of dialogue. How can we have empathy for the other if we are unable to reach out and create a space for a genuine moment of connection?

Fostering a space requires some sort of mutual area of interest (think of a venn diagram). Surely any two individuals will be able to find *something* they have in common and be able to dialogue; the challenge is more so *uncovering* what it is that we share.

The work of the Synod is to create a space where we foster dialogue with the *other*, those who are indifferent to us, or to eachother. How can we love someone if we don't know them?

The Gospel reading ends "for the measure you give will be the measure you get back". Our Synodal path calls us to create an 'equitable' space for encounter with the other. This inevitably requires some willingness on our part to do to be vulnerable and open. This openness is what Jesus is calling us to today in our Gospel – an openness to welcome not just those who love us, but also those to whom hearts are closed.


