The connections between Ezekiel, Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, and Mark's Gospel were not immediately evident to this brand new Catholic, but, on closer examination, they have worked together to inspire in me both wonder, and an understanding of God's promise that He has much to teach me this summer if I just slow down, shut up and listen for a while.

Ezekiel and Mark both contain references to Church growth, but it is interesting that 2 Corinthians talks about our personal relationship with God and His Church. It occurs to me that I must become stronger in my individual relationship with Him in order to effectively do my small part to strengthen the collective that is St. Basil's.

The summer season is upon us, and people often have the chance to escape for a couple of months from being programmed to the point of autopilot seven days a week. What an opportunity to just "hang out with God" in a nice shady spot under a big tree, and become re-acquainted in a real way.

Until recently, it had been many years since I've looked at my Bible. I always had difficulty figuring out just how to read it and apply it to my life. Where do I start? The real eye opener for me was picking up a copy of the Sunday Missal and starting there. It does so much more than simply allowing me follow along during Mass so that I don't look like such a newcomer to the rest of you. It has made me hungry for God's word, and by looking at the readings for the approaching Sunday, my heart can become fertile ground for the smallest seed to be planted.

This little companion to my Bible will constantly be with me this summer, and regardless of whether I make it to every week's Mass, it will cause me to spend time getting to know God in a new and more real way than ever before.

BOOK CLUB DISCUSSION


This past week, parishioners gathered to discuss "Community" by Peter Block. Though there will be more coming from this discussion, here are some thoughts to think about.

"A vibrant church community is a place of welcome and laughter, of healing and hope, of friends and family and justice and new life. It's where the homeless drop in for a bowl of soup and the elderly stop by for a chat. It's where one group is working to help drug addicts and another is campaigning for global justice. It's where you will find people learning to pray, coming to faith, struggling with temptations, finding new purpose, and getting in touch with a new power to carry that purpose out. It's where people bring their own small faith and discover, in getting together with others to worship the one true God, that the whole becomes greater than the sum of its parts." – NT Wright. (*The Next Christians by Gabe Lyons*)

"Some people think if we can make Christianity cool again, everyone will want in. Of course, people want to be liked, accepted, and respected by our peers, but unfortunately with this view, Christians overlook the inherent problem in their attempt to relate to culture – trying to be relevant makes them cultural followers, not cultural leaders." – (*The Next Christians by Gabe Lyons*)

"Restorative community is created when we allow ourselves to use the language of healing and relatedness and belonging without embarrassment. The essence of a restorative community is not economic prosperity or political discourse or the capacity of leadership; it is citizens' willingness to own up to their contribution, to be humble, to choose accountability and to have faith in their own capacity to make authentic promises to create an alternative future. In other words, it is the context in which each citizen chooses to be accountable rather than entitled.

Restoration is about healing our woundedness – in community terms, healing our fragmentation and incivility." – (*Community by Peter Block*)
