We are reminded in today's scriptures of the beauty and love of God that is present in all creation. Being able to see Jesus, Jesus saw him, and not only saw him but went to stay in his house. From that time he changed his view of things, he cleared up his corrupt life and received salvation. We know neither the time or place when Jesus may call us, but by practising awareness of natural beauty can at least help us to slow down and see differently.
