Saying "please" and "thank you" Leanna Cappiello

What if God suddenly took away everything that you forgot to say "thank you" for?

Imagine... losing the things you took for granted: your favorite sweater, your TTC metro card, your mobility, your hair, pillows, warm socks, that essential morning cup of coffee, that extra 5\$ bill you found in your winter coat pocket. Gone without warning. Imagine a life without toothpaste!

Thankfully, it doesn't work this way. God doesn't punish us because we take things for granted or forget to say "thank you". Though this alternate perspective does reveal what kinds of things we might take for granted.

God gives freely so that we may not be in a position to earn, but in a position to thank. We are not used to this, as our society demands we earn our living, our belonging, and our worthiness.

If our mentality is that we are entitled to certain things, we live out of a place of fear and rigidity, for we might earn one day and lose another. We begin to think we are alone, forced to covet our goods without sharing. In the gospel, Jesus offers a parable about a landowner's tenants who killed slaves in order to keep from feeling threatened of the harvest they felt they deserved and earned. 124 - 4

This parable gives us a taste of the frightening ferocity of having to earn our keep and stay on top.

Alternatively, if our mentality changes to that of responding to a gift that has been freely given, we live out of a place of joy and playfulness. The entire second reading is filled with words like "prayer", supplication", "thanksgiving", "honorable", "just", "praise" and "peace". It begins with "do not worry about anything" and ends with "keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me".

The former drives us to an individual pursuit of power; the latter motivates us to a community effort toward justice. Power steals life while the justice gives life.

We cannot "earn" our way into God's heart; we have already been given that gift. He invites us to ask and receive freely, we need only say thank you in our own way. How we act in response to thankfulness is how we are to live our daily lives: with joy, gratitude, and confidence in God's generous outpouring.

CHILDREN'S SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (R.C.I.A) is a program that welcomes new members into Roman Catholicism. This program is meant for all those who have been baptized in another Christian denomination and would like to be received into the Roman Catholic Church, or for those baptized in the Catholic tradition and would like to complete their initiation by receiving the Sacraments of Holy Communion and/or Confirmation.

R.C.I.A. begins with a period of Inquiry, which allows those in the program to encounter the Good News of the Gospels and be introduced to Roman Catholic theology. At the beginning of Lent, a Rite of Acceptance (for those who have not yet been baptized) and Welcome (for those who have been baptized in another faith tradition) marks the transition from the period of Inquiry into the Catechumenate.

The Period of Purification and Enlightenment begins with the Rite of Election celebrated on the first Sunday of Lent. At this point in the program, the entire Catholic community joins the catechumens in a period of reflection and repentance as we anticipate the Easter Triduum together. At the culmination of this period, after intense spiritual formation and prayer, our St. Basil's Parish community will joyfully welcome the catechumens into full membership with the Catholic Church when they receive the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion during the Easter Vigil on Saturday, April 4, 2015.

R.C.I.A will begin on Wednesday, October 8, 2014 and will meet every Wednesday evening from 7:00-9:00pm. Our RCIA schedule has been posted online under the heading "Sacraments- RCIA."

LITURGY OF THE HOURS RETURNS!

Since November we have been gathering in the sanctuary and reciting this ancient prayer of the church together. This is our prayer time as a community. Where the Liturgy of the Eucharist allows us to receive communion, the Liturgy of the Hours allows us to give praise – to give thanks, to give witness to God's grace in our lives, and to give voice to our needs, hopes and petitions as a community.

The Liturgy of the Hours has been said in monasteries, convents, and by religious, for many centuries. Since Vatican II, it has also become the liturgy for lay people. Said every day around the world, this form of liturgy basically answer's St. Paul's invitation for the church to pray "ceaselessly."

We recite psalms in a special cadence, alternating verses between the east and west choir stalls in the sanctuary. This affords us the opportunity to add our voice to that of our church, and at the same time to listen to the words as spoken by others so that our hearts can make their own sense of the poetry our eyes are reading.
