

PASTORAL CARE

BAPTISMS - If you are a registered parishioner of Assumption Parish (or another parish) and attend Mass regularly, there is no waiting period. You may call the Parish Office to schedule a date and you must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the baptism. If you belong to another parish, a letter of permission from your Pastor is required. If you are not a parishioner of any parish, you must register, attend Mass regularly, and there is a three-month waiting period before your child can be baptized.

CONFESSIONS - First Friday-(during exposition of the Blessed Sacrament), 8:30 am to 9:00 am; First Saturday - 9:30 am to 10:00 am By appointment only; Sundays - 11:30 am to 12:00 Noon, By appointment only.

MARRIAGES - One of the couple must be a registered member of the parish for at least 6 months and attend Mass here regularly. Please make arrangements at least six months before the wedding date. Marriage Preparation Course required.

SPIRITUAL COUNSELING - By appointment.

SACRAMENT OF THE SICK & COMMUNION FOR SHUT-INS -

Anyone who wishes to receive Anointing of the Sick or Holy Communion please call the office to have your name put on the list.

FUNERALS - Arrangements should be made firstly with the church, and then with the funeral director to insure proper Christian burial.

MASS for the HOLY SOULS

The HEROIC ACT in favor of the SOULS IN PURGATORY

O MY GOD! for Your greater glory, and to imitate as closely as possible the generous Heart of Jesus, my Redeemer, and also to testify my devotion to the Blessed Virgin, my Mother, who is also the Mother of the Souls in Purgatory, I place in her hands all my satisfactory works, as well as the fruit of all those which may be offered for my intention after my death, that she may apply them to the Souls in Purgatory according to her wisdom and good pleasure. **AMEN.**

A Heroic Act of Charity is the completely unselfish offering to God of all the satisfactory value of one's prayers and good works --- plus the value of any that might be offered for one after one's death --- for the benefit of the Souls in Purgatory, rather than for oneself. **RELICS of the SAINTS.** The veneration of sacred relics has a long history in the Church. The <u>first account</u> dates back to the martyrdom of St. Polycarp who was martyred by being burned at the stake in the amphitheater at Smyrna around the year 155 A.D. (*Cf. Office of Readings on the Memorial of St. Polycarp*). The Fathers of the Church take up the theme of the reverence paid to the sacred relics as early as the 4th and 5th centuries. *St. Jerome, declared, "We do not worship, we do not adore, for fear that we should bow down to the creature rather than to the creator, but <u>we venerate the relics of the martyrs in order the better to adore him whose martyrs they are</u>" (Ad Riparium, <i>i, P.L., XXII, 907*).

By the 1100s, relics were being venerated in churches and shrines which attracted numerous pilgrims. Through the centuries people believed that the wonder-working power of the saint was to be found not only in the entire body but also in every part of it and in objects that had been in contact with his person.

Respecting the belief of the people and confirming such practice in the Bible, <u>the Church do not</u> <u>attribute powers in the relics itself but that is</u> <u>veneration are occasion of God's miracles</u> (cf. Second Book of Kings 2:13; 13:20-21). The power of God is manifested in one who has true faith and it happened through practical/physical means (Matthew. 9:20-22; Acts 5:14-16 & 19:11-12).

Should Catholic esteem the bodies of the saints? In the 16th century the **Council of Trent** responded to the claims that both the veneration of the saints and their relics is contrary to Sacred Scripture, when it taught that *"the holy bodies of the holy martyrs and of the others who dwell with Christ . . . are to be honored by the faithful."*

In venerating the relics of the saints, we profess in everlasting life for those who have obediently witnessed to Christ and the Gospel here on earth. Also, we believe in the intercessory power which the saints enjoy in heaven as well as the truth of our closeness to the saints in the communion of saints we as members of the Church on earth and they as members of the Church in heaven.
