Today's Gospel reading combines two separate passages taken from the Gospel of Luke. First, we hear the opening verses where Luke establishes the purpose of his Gospel. His style is typical of polished Greek

and Roman literature. In this passage, we learn that Luke may have written to a specific person, Theophilus; but the word Theophilus may also be a general reference, functioning as the phrase "Dear Reader" might in contemporary writing. In Greek, the word Theophilus translates as "lover of God."

Today's Gospel reading then skips several chapters in which one would find the Infancy Narratives, Jesus' baptism by John, the temptations Jesus faced in the desert, and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. In chapter four of Luke's Gospel, we hear that Jesus is in his hometown of Nazareth, attending the synagogue on the Sabbath, which is said to be his custom. In this account, we find another important clue that Jesus lived as a faithful, observant Jew. As Jesus stands in the synagogue, he reads from the scroll that contains the words of the prophet Isaiah. This reading defines his ministry in continuity with Israel's prophetic

tradition. Jesus' ministry will include bringing glad tidings to the poor, liberty to captives, healing to the sick, freedom to the oppressed, and proclaiming a year acceptable to the Lord.

Through this text from Isaiah, Jesus announces God's salvation. The "year acceptable to the Lord" is a reference to the Jewish tradition of Sabbath years and jubilee. The Sabbath year was observed every seventh year and Jubilee every 50th year, which is even more relevant for us today as we, too, celebrate a Jubilee A year of favor, renewal and year of Hope. This tradition of Jubilee is the reconciliation. framework for God's promise of salvation. And yet in Jesus, something new begins. Jesus not only announces God's salvation, he brings this salvation about in his person. Jesus is God who visits His people. He is filled with the spirit of God and in that presence, the Kingdom of God is now at hand. It is made present in Jesus, in his life, death, and Resurrection and he will further send his Holy Spirit so that the Kingdom of God can be fulfilled. (Loyola Press).

ST. JOHN BOSCO - In 1859, Fr. John Bosco established the Society of St. Francis de Sales. He organized 15 seminarians and one teenage boy into the group and their purpose was to carry on his charitable work, helping boys with their faith formation and to stay out of trouble. The organization still exists today and continues to help people, especially children around the world. In the years that followed, Fr. Bosco eventually expanded his mission and died on January 31, 1888. The call for his canonization was immediate.

Pope Pius XI knew Fr. Bosco personally and agreed, declaring him blessed in 1929.

St. John Bosco was canonized on Easter Sunday, 1934 and he was given the title, "Father and Teacher of Youth."he is also known as the Angelic Doctor because of his work on celestial beings and angels.

Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple



At the end of fourth the century, а woman named Etheria made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, and he journal, discovered in 1887, gives an unprecedented

glimpse of the early liturgical life and celebrations of the Church. Among the celebrations she describes in her journal are the Feast of the Nativity, and the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple in which she describes a gala procession of lights.

Under the Mosaic Law, a woman was ritually "unclean" for 40 days after childbirth, and she would have to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice for her purification: a pair of turtledoves or two pigeons. That is why today's feast is also known as the Purification of Mary.

The primary emphasis on this Feast, however, is Christ and his first appearance in the temple. The observance of this feast is ancient that spread throughout the Western Church in the fifth and sixth centuries, and assigned to February 2nd, being 40 days after Christmas Day. Because the Church in the West celebrated Jesus' birth on December 25, the Presentation was moved to February 2, 40 days after Christmas. Traditionally at this Mass a candlelight procession opens the Mass and candles are blessed, giving the Feast its popular name, Candlemas Day. Since this Feast falls on a Sunday this year, there will be a blessing and procession of candles before all Masses next Weekend. If you have candles that you would like to be blessed, you may bring them with you at Mass next weekend.

Candles can also be purchased at the parish office this week, Tuesday to Friday morning. The cost of a box of 2 candles is \$5.00. We ordered a limited supply of candles, and any remaining will be placed at the back of the church at next Sunday Masses.
