

Sunday Reflection:

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany. The origin of the Solemnity of the Epiphany is complicated. The short version goes something like this: from early in the Church's history, there has been a practice to celebrate in January three significant events in the life of Christ: the arrival of the Wise Men to adore the child Jesus, his baptism by John in the Jordan River, and his first public miracle (turning water into wine at Cana in Galilee). What these three events emphasize in different ways is the revelation of Christ's divinity and the foreshadow his mission.

Significance of the Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh:

The gifts the Wise Men bring foreshadow the Messiah's role as a Redeemer-King: the gold is a gift appropriate for a king; myrrh was used as part of the preparations to anoint a body for burial (and this foreshadows his three days in the tomb after the crucifixion); and frankincense is used in religious ceremonies to make a sacrificial offering acceptable to God. Jesus is the Lamb of God, sacrificed on the altar of the Cross for our sins and offered to God on our behalf. The gifts are appropriate for a king but they foreshadow a different crown and throne for him: a crown of thorns and a wooden Cross. Fr. Geoff

Understanding the Mass – The Prefaces to the Eucharistic Prayer:

The Prayer immediately before the Eucharistic Prayer is called the "Preface". There are many different ones that reflect the special feasts during the liturgical year but the first part of all of the Prefaces is the same. It begins with "The Lord be with you" (and the people respond: "And with your spirit") and it continues with "Lift up your hearts". The people's response is: "We lift them up to the Lord". In the final part of the dialogue, the priest says: "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God" and the response is: "It is right and just". This response reflects the fact that thanking God is not only the right thing for us to do, but considering everything that God has done for us, it is the just thing to do as well. We owe God our thanks for His goodness and blessings and this response highlights that reality. The rest of the Preface varies with each of the individual ones but we notice that the language in general follows the more formal and dignified way of speaking to God that we are now accustomed to using in the New Missal.
